SUPERVISORS TO SANCTION BANDS FOR COMMUNITIES

Under a plan proposed by Supervisor Raymond V. Darby, school musicians throughout the County of Los Angeles will be enabled to keep in practice by organization of community bands, preferably at public parks and recreation areas.

The Board of Supervisors has instructed Dr. Karl Wecker, county musical advisor, to contact the various high schools and junior colleges throughout the county, advising them that bands and orchestras will be organized under county sanction wherever the response is favorable to the idea. "In our home towns back east the community and village bands were a part of our social life and it seems to me they should fill the same need in our Metropolitan area," Supervisor Darby remarked.
