### Eat Vegetables Is Plea As Bread Supplies Are Cut

A 25 percent cut was announced April 19 in the bread supply. That isn't all that is being done to conserve wheat. Livestock inventories are being reduced, and the use of wheat has been stopped for making alcohol and beer. These and many other things, the farm advisor states, are being done to conserve wheat and other grains.

Every home owner can help the food supply in this country and the world by raising vegetables and such cereals as beans and sweet corn during the summer, peas in the fall and winter.

Grow vegetables that you can use during the entire year, and plant extra areas to crop that can easily be stored dry. This latter kind of food can substitute for the foods we must ship abroad," he states.

**AIR PARCEL POST**  
In reporting on a survey made to airline and postal officials, inspector C. E. Miller of the Post Office pointed out the cost of moving a 70-pound parcel via air mail in the first two zones would cost \$2.33. The rates rise until in the eighth zone, which is beyond the 2000 mile limit, the cost would be \$37.37.

### High Ranking Officers Feature Mass Installation

Mass installation of post officers of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in the Pasadena Rose Bowl on Sunday afternoon, April 28, at 2 o'clock will be featured by the presence of high ranking officers of the Navy, Army and Marine corps, music by a crack Navy band, the oath of allegiance to 250 Navy recruits, and a squadron of Marine Corsair fighters.

J. E. Vanderclute, of Los Angeles, fifth district commander of the overseas veterans organization, made that announcement, and at the same time revealed that Jeanette MacDonald, color star of opera, concert stage and screen, will appear as the featured vocalist.

The impressive ceremonies will bring together government and military dignitaries, including Rear Admiral E. M. Pace Jr., representing the commandant of the Eleventh Naval District; Rear Admiral Lloyd J. Witke, commandant of the United States Navy Base at Terminal Island, and Brigadier General William J. Wallace, in command of Marine aviation on the West coast.

Others are Major General Frank B. Merrill, famed as leader of the Marauders in the China-Burma-India theater of war, who will represent the Secretary of War Patterson; Mayor Fletcher Bowron of Los Angeles, and city officials of Pasadena.

### Bermuda Grass Good Fertilizer For Your Garden

It sounds funny, but it's true, but the mat of accumulated organic matter on old bermuda grass sod will make garden plants grow vigorously, and you need not worry about the bermuda grass taking over your garden. No, not even if you just spade the bermuda grass sod, and plant the garden immediately, because you can both raise a garden and kill the bermuda grass at the same time if you know how.

The trick is to cover the garden area with much paper, old linoleum, paper-lined burlap sacks, a couple of layers of heavy building paper, or even six or eight thicknesses of newspaper, anything that will cut out the light. Put down the paper much covering and set young plants in small holes through the paper. They'll grow but the weeds will be smothered.

### Need For Additional Hospital Beds In Southland Stressed In Conference

Fifty thousand Southland citizens will have their lives materially shortened in the next 12 months because they will be unable to get into a hospital in Los Angeles county.

This was the warning issued Monday by nationally-known hospital authority James A. Hamilton, former president of the American Hospital Association.

He spoke at a luncheon meeting attended by 250 representatives of civic organizations, hospitals and health service leaders at the Ambassador hotel. Attending from Torrance were R. R. Smith, president, and Grover C. Whyte, vice-president, of the Torrance Hospital Assn., administrative body of the Torrance Memorial Hospital. Plans for expansion of the Torrance institution, which is community owned and non-profit are already completed and construction can begin as soon as financing is arranged. Approximately \$150,000 is needed, according to architects' estimates.

Hamilton, in Los Angeles for the past month to survey acute hospital needs here, revealed that the county needs at least 6000 additional beds to keep pace with its population growth and economic development.

As a result of Hamilton's estimate of the vitally needed hospital accommodations, which would cost about \$60,000,000, a local administrative committee was formed to investigate present and future hospital needs here.

Chairman of the committee, which will assist interested citizens, social agencies, civic organizations, hospitals and health departments to provide a systematic development of health services, will be Robert L. Smith, vice president and general manager of the Torrance Hospital.

Hamilton admitted that Los Angeles county is beginning an era of great economic development, but he added that development and all progress depends in a large measure on the health of the people.

"There is ample evidence," he reminded his audience, "to show that the county is not prepared at the moment to meet the health needs of this expanding future."

Survey of hospital needs here by Hamilton was in behalf of local groups concerned with the provisions of adequate hospital facilities.

Harvey S. Mudd, Los Angeles industrialist and prominent in community service organizations, introduced the speaker.

### State Guard To Fire On Range Sunday

Troops of Company H, 2nd Battalion, 39th Regiment, California State Guard, will fire qualification rounds on the 30-caliber U. S. Rifle and machine gun on Sunday, according to Captain R. L. Lewellen, commanding officer.

The firing will be done on the Ft. MacArthur range at White Point, for the 30 calibre U. S. Rifle 200 yard range, and on the 1000 inch range at the fort, for the machine guns.

The firing will be done for marksmen, sharpshooter and expert medals which are being awarded to troops of the California State Guard by the adjutant general's department.

Company H drills each Monday night in the armory in Torrance ball park, and enlistments are being taken, both on Monday and Thursday evenings.

### 'Family Night' Program Of Boys Club Is Success

The Boys Club program for "family night" presented in the Torrance Civic Auditorium Tuesday night was announced yesterday "as a huge success." The Veterans of Foreign Wars, who sponsor the growing Boys Club organization, said the evening progressed even beyond expectations.

James Van Dyck, who was recently obtained by the Vets to direct the Torrance Boys Club Band, spoke before the group announcing his plans and requirements for boys participating in the event.

First rehearsals of the band were conducted yesterday afternoon for 20 of the musical aspirants, followed by the advanced group in which more than 40 musicians participated. Rehearsals were conducted in the Torrance Men's Bible Class hall.

Guest speaker of the evening, Captain Everett D. Penrod, Army chaplain, spoke briefly on the applications of Boys Clubs in every day life, in which he commended organizations with foresight to create clubs for boys in behalf of the community's welfare.

Many of the areas leading citizens, who are working in behalf of the VFW project, attended the affair.
