**Research Head At National Presents Talk**

The Southern California Section of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers met on Wednesday, April 24 at the Rodger Young Auditorium in Los Angeles.

The engineers gathered at a dinner meeting to hear Leslie J. Larrieu and M. T. Archer, Larrieu, chief chemist for Morris P. Kirk and Sons, Inc., was the principal speaker and described the "Manufacture and Laboratory Control of Zinc Base Alloys in a Los Angeles Smelter."

Archer, director of research for National Supply Company, gave a short talk on his trip to China with Donald Nelson. Archer accompanied Donald Nelson on his mission to China to study the rehabilitation of heavy industry destroyed by the years and to investigate the possibilities of expanded economic activity.

The technical talk by Larrieu presented the Zamor series of zinc alloys in their actual role of precision alloys, subject to the closest specifications and tolerances. The complete manufacturing details from raw materials to finished alloys was presented. In addition, the Speerograph was described and explained. Some other non-ferrous alloys and their manufacture also were mentioned in the illustrated talk.

**Raymond Named To NACA; Will Attend Parley**

Arthur E. Raymond, Southern California appointee of President Truman to National Advisory Committee on Aeronautics, today prepared to attend the semi-annual deliberations of this important scientific body in Washington next week.

Appointment of Raymond, engineering vice president of Douglas Aircraft company, and of R. M. Hazen, chief engineer Allison Division General Motors, was announced in Washington by Dr. Jerome C. Hunsaker, NACA chairman.

The vacancies were created with the resignations of Dr. William F. Durland, professor emeritus of mechanical engineering at Stanford University, and Dr. Edward Warner, now president of the interim council of the provisional international civil aviation organization.

**AIR LEGISLATION**

More than 50 bills having to do with aviation have been introduced in the present 79th Congress and over 2,000 aviation bills were introduced in the legislatures of the 48 states during the 1944-45 cycle of regular and special sessions.

**PROTECTION OF CALIFORNIA SEALS IS INVESTIGATED**

Basing his information on recent newspaper reports to the effect that the State Fish and Game Commission was going to do away with the seals off the California Coast, and the fishing industry, Supervisor Raymond V. Darby brought the matter to the attention of the board, and on his motion the matter was referred to the Chief Administrative Officer for investigation and report on what steps could be taken to protect the seals at Catalina island.

**WAR PLANES**

More than \$40,000,000 worth of Army and Navy bombers, fighters and aircraft equipment have been made available to qualified educational institutions. This equipment was sold at nominal fees through the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

**Los Angeles Gives Franchises To Harbor Taxicabs**

Nine-year franchises to taxicab companies serving Wilmington and San Pedro have been authorized by the Los Angeles city council. The companies had operated heretofore under annual permits. The franchises expire October 30, 1955.

Gordon F. Kendrick, operating as the Wilmington Cab Company, was granted a franchise for the area south of 162nd street, excluding San Pedro. He now holds permits for 20 cabs.

Frank Masse of the Southwest Transportation Company, Inc., was granted a franchise for the same period in the San Pedro district and that part of Terminal island lying within the city of Los Angeles. He had permits for 17 cabs.

The territory allotted the two companies is outside the territory of the Yellow Cab Company. Each company is required to pay the city \$1.25 per cab quarterly, plus two percent of gross receipts.

**Many Veterans Reinstating NSLI Policies**

Waiving of physical examinations until January 1, 1947, has resulted in Southern California veterans reinstating National Service Life Insurance policies at the rate of \$200,000 daily.

L. C. Chapman, regional manager of the Veterans Administration, announced, "The change in the reinstatement requirements for government insurance," Chapman said, "has benefited many veterans who were unable to reinstate their policies under the previous regulation. The new policy requires only a statement from the veteran certifying his health has not changed since the policy lapsed. Many veterans, because of disabilities, are unable to qualify for commercial insurance. By reinstating their National Service Life Insurance, they are provided with maximum protection at the minimum rate."

A streamlined insurance service has already gone into effect at the Veterans Administration Regional Office, 1041 S. Broadway. Veterans may now reinstate their policies and pay premiums at the local office. This service will be extended in the near future to sub-regional V.A. offices throughout Southern California.

**PARKS MAY BUY NEW POWER LAWNMOWER**

The City Park department was authorized by the City Council Tuesday night to purchase a new power mower at a cost of about \$800.

The old mower will be kept, as delivery cannot be expected until next fall, it was pointed out.

**Governor Joins Appeal For Food Conservation**

Governor Earl Warren this week called on the people of California to support President Truman's appeal to the American people to conserve the food needed to avert world starvation.

"I call upon the people of California to join in this great cause for humanity," the Governor said. "One of our cardinal religious teachings is to 'Feed the hungry.'"

"I urge the people of all states to accept the challenge, and all civic, trade, fraternal and other associations to organize themselves voluntarily, within their own communities, to practice this self denial so that millions of the people of the world may live."

"The help we can give, through saving food and sharing it with the stricken, can be the noblest expression of humanity the world has ever seen, an example of compassion that will endure through the centuries."

"The State of California will do its part. I have ordered all State Departments to put themselves at the immediate disposal of every community, and to assist in this crusade against the spectre of starvation and disease that threatens the world today."
