

Contract For Channel Bridge Is Awarded

The state has awarded a \$264,279 contract to Oberg Bros. of Inglewood for the construction of a steel overhead crossing extending from the mainland to Terminal Island freeway at Wilmington.

The outlet will head traffic from the freeway towards Long Beach with the overhead crossing carrying traffic over the Southern Pacific railroad tracks to Anaheim Blvd.

The contract is one of five that have been awarded for the construction of the Terminal Island freeway over Anaheim, a state engineer said. Others include a viaduct approximately 1600 feet long which will cross Anaheim diagonally from Perry to Laurence ave., and several branching arms which will allow traffic to leave the freeway and head either towards San Pedro or Long Beach on Anaheim.

Joshua Tree Monument Future Is Discussed

A subcommittee aimed to promote "harmony of action" between the miners, landowners and desert resort interests relative to proposed revision of the Joshua Tree National Monument boundaries will shortly be appointed as a result of the Southern Regional Mining Conference held in San Bernardino last week.

The conference was sponsored jointly by the California State Chamber of Commerce and the San Bernardino County Chamber of Commerce.

The meeting was attended by over 125 representatives from Los Angeles, Riverside, San Bernardino, Imperial and Inyo counties. Henry Mulryan, Los Angeles mining engineer and member of the State Chamber Statewide Industrial Committee, presided.

The conference was undertaken with the idea that each group could explain its aims and desires concerning boundaries and use policies of the Joshua Monument and that some plan could be evolved whereby the economic future of the area embraced by the desert counties would be furthered through "harmony of action" within industries concerned.

CHP Aids In Police Traffic Safety Check

Members of the California Highway Patrol will participate in a nationwide Police Traffic Safety Check, beginning May 15, Patrol Chief E. Raymond Cato announced today.

The check covers an inspection of the driver's license and plates and a test of brakes, lights, tires, windshield wipers and horns of all vehicles involved in moving violations. It is sponsored by the International Association of Chiefs of Police and will start simultaneously in all parts of the United States and Canada. It has been timed to follow President Truman's Safety Conference in Washington, D. C., May 8-10.

Chief Cato, who is California's coordinator for the Association in the check, said police departments of at least 90 per cent of the incorporated cities and towns of the state will participate.

The program has the support of Governor Earl Warren and Edgar E. Lampton, Director of Motor Vehicles. Nationwide support includes more than 100 organizations such as the National Safety Council and the National Committee for Traffic Safety.

The check is an elaboration of the brake testing check conducted by the Association a year ago, Cato explained, and is designed to focus public attention on the need of having repairs made on cars that have become old and unsafe.

Only vehicles that have been stopped for a moving violation will be checked. Drivers involved will be given warning citations requiring them to have needed repairs made and will be handed educational folders stressing the need of safe driving and keeping vehicles in good repair.

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
