HOME COMMENTATOR

SOMETHING FROM NOTHING! Whether it's in attic, scrap bag or junk yard, there are always possibilities of a bright future for many a thing thrown into discard!

PAGING CINDERELLA! . . . Member those camp stools whose covers gave way on the last trip out? Turn them into luggage racks for the guest room by stripping them of the canvas seats. Varnish, stain or paint the wood. For each, make three two-inch wide strips of chintz or other material having a roomy, a tray holder, the strips may be of needle point, cross stitch or some of the room's upholstery or drapery material. Quite easily it may become a permanent coffee table!

ORANGE CRATE MAGIC! . . . There's an orange crate on the kindling pile, isn't there? May be two. And you could use bed-side tables. Line them with oilcloth of the desired color, cut, fitted and pasted in place. You'll need a yard of 46-inch oilcloth for lining each crate. Make gathered skirt pieces of chintz, cretonne or a gay print, and tack to the top of the sides and back (it doesn't have to go clear around). Then make a top cover with a 4-inch all-around frill to thumb-tack or baste into place. The shelves can hold books, magazines, bed-side radio, water jug. Imagine them red oilcloth-lined, with red and white checked cotton material, and crisp frills of white muslin, organza or eyelid embroidery. It will take a 2 to 3 yards of the checked material, depending upon width, and 1/2 yard material for ruffles for each table.

By connecting the two covered crates with a piece of heavy glass or a long board, covered and be-ruffled, this something-out-of-nothing trick becomes a dressing table. Now you need a dressing table stool. Using a butter tub, nail lid to bottom. Make cushion of cotton batting, stitched to fit. Dress in ruffly skirt with big ribbon sash.

FLASH

IF IT'S UP TO MAMMA TO MAKE MINOR REPAIRS about the house, fit up a breadboard with a house-hold carpentry kit—hammer, screw driver, pliers, wrench—and hang it by screw eyes on a kitchen or entry wall. Painting tool handles and edge of board makes it quite attractive.
