County Assumes Control Of Big Army Hospital

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management and disposal of the Engineers Department; Allan Sapp, project manager; E. H. Spickard, chief of the Los Angeles sub-office; Major Carl G. Schone, commanding officer of the San Francisco Port of Embarkation's installation at Fort MacArthur, which has taken over the U.S.A. activities since abandonment of the port by the army; Capt. Lamar Matson, M. C., U.S.A., who has had charge of army medical supply at the hospital since March 31.

Brig. Gen. Wayne R. Allen, county chief administrative officer, also was present for the ceremony, and representing Torrance were the Rev. Miles C. Northrup, pastor of First Baptist church; Harry B. Lewis, president of Torrance Lions club which organization last November made the original suggestion to Supervisor Darby that the county take over the army hospital for use as a branch county facility; Frank S. Selover, managing editor of the Torrance Herald and secretary of the Lions; Dr. E. C. Smiley, in charge of the Torrance Health Center of the county.

Darby explained that the County of Los Angeles now is in full control of the hospital, while the actual cost of acquisition of the facility yet is to be fixed by the government and yet is to be paid.

He declared that the county hospital in the harbor district is filling a need for this population center which has been noticed throughout the years, and that the acquisition of the army facility and its equipment is a step toward better service to the harbor district which might have been accomplished at an earlier date.

"He paid a compliment to the Torrance Lions club in his statement that the original suggestion met his immediate approval and was followed through not only by his office but the Lions club as well to a point where the original objective has been realized.

"That is the way to do things," Darby declared in his tribute to the Torrance organization.
