

Mother Of Three Auto Mishap Puts To Be Evicted From Home Here One In Hospital; Another In Jail

Mrs. Ernest Carter, mother of three small children, and whose husband is at sea with the Merchant Marine, will be evicted Monday from her residence at 1664 W. 218 st., where she has made her home for the past two years, according to J. G. Caldwell, Veteran Service Center director. Caldwell also revealed that his office is powerless to aid because there are no housing rights under the G. I. Bill for the Merchant serviceman.

"If this young woman is evicted," Caldwell said, "and is unable to find adequate housing for herself and children, then it is very likely that the Bureau of Public Assistance will take over the children. This in many cases means a separation of children from the mother."

Both the BPA and the local service center have been trying, since Mrs. Carter received her first eviction notice, to secure quarters for the family, but to date neither has been successful, he said.

Edward Ady, 31, 1005 W. 256 st., was in St. Mary's hospital at Long Beach last night, and Alfred J. Sonnichsen, 37, of 2212 Lomita blvd. is in Torrance City jail in lieu of \$1,000 bail as the result of an auto accident at Carson st. and Crenshaw blvd. late yesterday afternoon.

Driver of the car in which Ady is said to have sustained a fractured skull was Robert Eng, 1016 W. 256 st., who suffered shock and bruises when his car collided with Sonnichsen's auto. Both Ady and Eng are in business here at the Texaco service station corner Arlington ave. and Carson st.

Sonnichsen, who was booked at the local police station for drunk driving resulting in bodily injury, a felony, was not injured in the crash, police said. Ady was first taken to the Torrance Memorial hospital by Sullivan's ambulance and later removed to Long Beach.

Both cars were badly wrecked, the report said.

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


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
