**Exhibit Of Plastics To Be Continued**

Because numerous requests have been received from schools and other groups outside the city, the Plastics Industry Exhibit, now running at the State Exposition Building in Los Angeles, has been extended through May 30.

This exhibit, the first of a series of post-war industry shows, scheduled by the permanent exposition building, has been open to the public since April 1, with more than 60,000 persons having attended during the month. According to Louis C. Venator, manager of the building, this figure breaks all previous attendance records.

A new type of "industry show," the present exhibition was planned and installed by a group of industry members of the exhibit staff of the building and members of the Society of the Plastics Industry. It departs from the usual industrial exhibitions in that it was planned from the consumers viewpoint and depicts the industry from the laboratory to the finished article. The sources of many types of plastics are shown, with the chemical and mechanical processes that turn coal and wood pulp and milk into nylons and machine parts and hairbrushes. The inherent qualities of the many different types of plastics are charted, so that, for instance, those with great tensile strength can intelligently be chosen for heavy duty and those which are resistant to heat and cold used where these factors occur. Several thousand articles made from plastics are also included, covering such different things as a lightweight plastic "iron lung," bullet-proof airplane parts, art objects, contact lenses and a beautifully toned violin.

The State Exposition Building is a state institution operated by the Sixth District Agricultural Association for the display of California's agricultural, industrial and other resources. In addition to the temporary post-war industrial shows, the building contains beautiful permanent exhibits of these subjects. Adjoining the Coliseum and the Rose Garden in Exposition Park, the building is open to the public from noon until 5 p.m. every day except Monday. Admission is free.

**Carelessness Is Blamed For Most Forest Fires**

Statistics show that 90 per cent of all forest fires last year were caused by human carelessness and could therefore be prevented. U. S. Forestry officials in a campaign to minimize annual losses and damages to the nation's natural resources, point out to residents of this community planning summer vacations in the mountains, five rules for safety in the forests:

1. Break every match in two.
2. If you must build outdoor fires, first ask if the law requires a permit.
3. Drown every outdoor fire with water, or smother fire with earth from which leaves are removed.
4. Crush out thoroughly your cigarette, cigar or pipe ashes.
5. Smoke only in designated areas where smoking is permitted.
