

**Chamber Raps  
Parking Meters;  
Suggests Remedy**

recommends that our City government or the Chamber of Commerce arrange with owners of certain vacant lots in the central business district to be designated by the committee for customer parking, so that these lots may be cleared of the prevailing debris and improved by an oil formula mix using the sandy loam, with the aim of providing satisfactory surfaced areas for parking.

**Employee Parking Lots:** That lots be provided for the all-day parking of merchants and their employees. The committee recommends that all parking lots be provided with signs designating entrance and exit, and that all be provided with signs designating their specific use.

**After investigating problems of control and disposal of rubbish in the retail district,** the committee consisting of E. F. Dominguez, chairman, Sam Levy and James A. Evans, recommended:

**Vacant Lots:** That all lot owners in the central business district be notified to clean up said lots and to maintain them in a tidy condition, thus removing these lots as areas of rubbish accumulation. Failure of lot owners to respond to this reasonable request, that the City of Torrance enact additional legislation, if needed, to provide for the cleaning and maintaining of these vacant lots at the owners expense.

**Incinerators:** The committee recommends that all rubbish disposal incinerators in the central business district be banned.

**Locked Receptacles:** The committee recommends that locked receptacles of a type approved by our Fire Department be provided by all merchants that use the rear of the property where rubbish accumulates outside of any building.

**Sweepings:** The committee recommends that all merchants gather up store and/or sidewalk sweepings and deposit them in sidewalk receptacles.

**Sidewalk Receptacles:** The committee recommends that sidewalk receptacles of an approved and durable type be purchased and placed at strategic locations throughout our retail district.

**Rubbish Control:** The committee recommends and solicits the cooperation of all merchants providing that no rubbish be placed outside their establishments after the last evening pick-up unless same is placed in receptacles herein mentioned for that purpose.

**Street Sweeper:** The committee recommends that the City of Torrance purchase a mechanical street sweeper of a design adaptable to sweeping all alleys throughout the retail district as well as the streets.

**Modern Pick-up Truck:** The committee recommends the purchase of a Gar-Wood Bucket Loaded (See attached illustration) for the efficient handling of rubbish collection, or any other mechanical equipment of this type for the purpose of eliminating the scattering of rubbish while the vehicle is traveling. The committee feels that with this type of equipment the manpower efficiency of the crew members will likewise be increased immeasurably.

**Aviation Leaders  
Guests Of Lions

Tuesday was "aviation day" at the regular weekly meeting of the Torrance Lions club and the program featured presentations of two films of action in the South Pacific heretofore not presented in this community.

With Frank S. Selover, managing editor of the Torrance Herald and secretary of the Lions club, acting as program chairman, Major Arthur H. Nefz gave a talk on the needs of recruiting of young men in the Marine Corps, and, with the assistance of S/Sgt. Gilbert E. Mitchell, a Marine Corps paratrooper who saw much action in the South Pacific, as did Major Nefz, presented films of other phases of the war.

Other airmen present included Major H. C. Holmes, CAP, commander of the Third Group of the Civil Air Patrol at the local flight strip; Clifford C. **Edmund G. Brown, Attorney General  
Candidate, Returns May Pay Check**

Edmund G. Brown, district attorney for San Francisco and candidate for the office of attorney general of California in the November election, has returned to the controller of the City and County of San Francisco his salary check for the month of May, 1946, in the amount of \$644.06, due to the fact that he was "campaigning for the office of Attorney General and did not devote my full time and attention to the duties of my office."

He said: "I wish that you would advise the Board of Supervisors that this is no mere gesture on my part, but a sincere feeling in what I think is the right thing to do. If I were a candidate for re-election to the office of District Attorney or if my term of office had expired, I would not feel constrained to return any part of my salary, because it is my opinion that being a candidate for re-election or a candidate for some other office is part and parcel of the reward that follows election to public office.

"I intend to wage an intense fight for the office of Attorney General of California, but I do not intend to spend vast sums of money on billboards, radio time, advertisements, etc. in an effort to buy the office.

"I intend to conduct my campaign in my own name and upon my own record.

"The voters of California have nominated Earl Warren as the candidate of both parties, thereby assuring his election in November. It is my intention as well as my duty to accept this mandate of the voters and support Governor Warren in all of his efforts to bring a better government to our state.

"When I am elected Attorney General of California, it will be my duty as the chief law-enforcement officer of the state to:

**Plea For Aid  
On Airport Deal  
Gets Response**

Responding to the appeal of Mayor J. Hugh Sherkey, Jr., for support of civic organizations to the city's effort to acquire as Torrance municipal airport the Army's flight strip in south Torrance, the Lions club adopted a resolution directing "a plea to all governmental agencies and individuals involved that immediate action be taken" to turn the airport over to Torrance.

The Torrance Aviation Commission meeting Monday afternoon discussed the progress toward securing the port with city officials.

The 480-acre airport developed by the Army is in the control of two governmental agencies, the Bureau of Public Roads which has offered the city a three-year permit for possession of the 89 acres involved in the air strip itself, and the War Assets Administration, which controls the surrounding 400-odd acres.

City Attorney J. E. McCall has been endeavoring to induce the public roads bureau to turn the strip over to the WAA and the WAA has agreed to deed the entire 480-acre port to the city, it is reported.
