The membership are set up. The charter requires only a simple majority, and it was written under the provisions of the state law which gives the City Council the right to prepare and submit to the voters a City Charter, without the election of a city manager.

The thought was originally expressed by the Mrs. Evelyn Carr of the Torrance Parents Association that since the municipal government setup would remain the same under the proposed charter, the election of freeholders to draft the charter would be a costly and delaying procedure.

The charter would be presented to the State Legislature in January for ratification, and then the Board of Supervisors would consult on the fixing of boundaries of the new school districts.

### Attitude Shown

The attitude of the people on the question was clearly set out at the recent Los Angeles schools bond issue when 14 of 17 Torrance precincts voted 9 to 7 against the bonds while the rest of the Los Angeles district was voting from 7 to 1 in favor of them.

In urging speed in placing the school issue in the charter for presentation to the people, the proponents of the measure pointed out that it is costing Torrance \$1,000 a day to remain in the Los Angeles city school system. Some \$650,000 a year is raised in or on behalf of Torrance for operation of the schools of Torrance, and only approximately one half of that is spent in Torrance. The rest goes to the Los Angeles schools general funds.

Proponents point out that if this \$350,000 a year now spent in Torrance were under Torrance control, new schools would be built and paid for on a "cash payment" basis. Needed are a new high school, separating the junior and senior high school students; a new elementary school; additions and improvements to present schools, a new gymnasium for boys at the present high school, athletic

## FEDERAL GOVERNMENT Approves 1200-MILE GAS PIPELINE

ASSURES ADDITIONAL GAS SUPPLY FOR GROWING SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

On May 31, the Federal Power Commission approved construction of a Texas-California pipeline project to be completed at a cost of more than \$70,000,000. Based on applications of Southern California and Southern Counties Gas Companies and El Paso Natural Gas Company, the project is to augment California's natural gas supply from the extensive reserves in Texas and New Mexico. To be completed for the Winter of 1947-48.

**Future Supply**

The natural gas it is to transport would care for every home in the four metropolitan cities of Akron, San Antonio, Des Moines and Indianapolis combined. At its ultimate capacity, it will deliver the equivalent energy daily of 47,000 barrels of oil... or 189 carloads of coal... or three times the electrical energy produced by Boulder Dam.

**Work Started**

Preliminary work is under way: orders for the 258,000 tons of pipe have been placed; a survey of the 1200-mile route has nearly been completed.

Actual construction will provide more than 4,000,000 man-hours of work. It starts early this Fall and will be ready for the Winter of 1947-48.

The approval of this project, so vital to Southern California's future development, is a gratification we believe every home owner can share.
