ALBERT COAST

Second Lt. US Army, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Coast, 736 Border ave., entered the service Mar. 30, 1945, and after completing his basic training was selected for Officers Candidate School. He was commissioned 2nd Lt. of Infantry April 18, 1946. His wife, Mrs. Anabel Coast, resides at 1870 218th st.



EARL P. KENT JR.

1st Lt. USNR, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl P. Kent, 1752 Border, was discharged from the Navy following three years of service. He served aboard the USS Pennsylvania and was awarded the Presidential Unit Citation for his part in the attack on Attu and every amphibious operation up to the invasion of Lingayen Gulf. The impressive war record of his ship also includes twelve island invasions and one major surface engagement.



FRANK H. FROHNHOEFER

Pfc. AUS, entered the service Aug. 6, 1942 and was discharged Dec. 25, 1945, after serving many months with the 164th Inf. Reg. of the Americal Division. He saw action in the Southern Philippines and the Solomons, and was awarded the Silver Star Medal for gallantry under fire in the Bougainville campaign. Besides the Silver Star, Frohnhoefer earned the Combat Infantry Badge, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Ribbon, American Theatre Ribbon, Philippine Liberation Ribbon, Good Conduct Medal and the World War II Victory Medal.



JOHN N. TRIPPE

Sgt. US Army, husband of the former Ruth Seaborn, 2227 Andro ave., was attached to a searchlight battalion in the European Theatre of Operations for 25 months and participated in the North African and Italian campaigns receiving battle stars for his work with the artillery. Before shipping out Trippe was stationed with the Coast Artillery near Torrance. He was discharged August 29, 1945, after serving his country for nearly five years.



JAMES W. BARKER

S/Sgt. US Army, served from March to September, 1945; secretary of the Moose lodge, Torrance, and well-known in Moose circles throughout the state.



JOSEPH G. MCINTIER

Corporal, USAAF, son of Mrs. Anna McIntier, 1735 Gramercy ave., entered the service October 26, 1942 and was discharged February 18, 1946.

NORMAN L. PETERSON

Radioman 2/c USN, enlisted Dec. 14, 1942 and was discharged Oct. 29, 1945. Served on Saipan, Rikisa, Alaska and Marshall islands. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Johnson and husband of Billie Ruth Johnson, 2073 Carson st.



EARL B. SMITH
