JOSEPH VAN KRALINGEN
S 1/c, USCG, entered the service August, 1942, and was discharged October 9, 1945. Served in the Pacific area for 20 months and was assigned as a printer at Wilmington, Calif., upon his return. Won Asiatic-Pacific Ribbon with two campaign stars, Good Conduct Medal, American Theatre Medal, Victory Medal, World War II. Husband of Dorothy Van Kralingen, 9166-C Portola ave., and son of Anthony Van Kralingen, 2304 Gramercy ave. He is an apprentice printer at the Torrance Herald.



GEORGE CARROLL MOORE

CMM USN, enlisted in the US Navy in 1933 at 16 years of age, but the Navy didn't catch up with him until he was old enough to be in legally. He saw duty in the Pacific before and during the war aboard a fleet oiler (tanker). His ship was torpedoed off the Solomon Islands in the early stages of the war, and Moore and his shipmates were under fire both from surface guns and aircraft. He was hospitalized in Sydney, Australia and had 65 pieces of shrapnel removed from his legs. He is shown in dungarees shortly after his promotion to chief in 1943. He worked at Doak Aircraft while on rehabilitation leave and is shown in a gay mood sporting his campaign ribbons and employees badge.



FREDERICK P. SHIDLER

Lieut MC, USN, son of Mrs. Mina A. Shidler, 1310 Manuel ave., is a veteran of 17 months duty in the South Pacific. Lt Shidler is shown as he received the Bronze Star Medal for professional gallantry when he completed an appendectomy while under enemy attack. Three doctors, nineteen wounded men and 14 crew members were killed by a suicide plane which struck his ship, the USS Pinkney, while Shidler was performing the operation.
