Millions Shown In Back Orders Of Large Firm

Unfilled orders of Dresser Industries, Inc., at the end of the second quarter of its fiscal year totaled \$40,500,000, double its output for the first half, and sufficient to continue all operations well into 1947 at full capacity, according to the company's quarterly letter to shareholders made public today.

The letter reported a net loss (without provision for tax carry-back) for the half year ending April 30, 1946, of \$890,511 on a sales volume of \$20,981,243.

Commenting upon the earnings figures, H. N. Mallon, president of the company, said:

"Wage advances have been made in all of our plants. The cost of materials has been steadily rising. Work stoppages and material shortages caused by strikes in other industries have seriously hampered volume and output, and have even compelled shutdowns in some of our plants. Meanwhile, the small price relief thus far granted to some of our companies has been too recent to be reflected in current

Short-Term Enlistments In State Guard

Short-term enlistments now are being taken in Company H, 2nd Battalion, 39th Regiment, California State Guard, as the Torrance unit prepares for possible induction into the National Guard, according to Capt. R. L. Lewellen, commanding officer.

The City of Torrance has requested a unit of the National Guard for this city, and the Adjutant General's department has indicated that it will be granted in view of the record of Company H during the war years.

"Now it is up to the citizens of Torrance to show that they want the National Guard company here by enlisting in the State Guard and filling the ranks," Captain Lewellen said.

About 20 men are needed, and there are opportunities for promotion in non-commissioned officer and commissioned officer grades, he declared. Enlistment in the State Guard does not mean that the guardsman will be taken into the National Guard, the captain pointed out, as all State Guardsmen will be discharged and those who qualify reenlisted in the National Guard with its pay and encampment privileges.

It is expected that within the next few months the National Guard will be activated and the War Department is making thorough inspections of various State Guard units preparatory to the switch-over. They are by stillwell and his staff from Sixth Army headquarters in San Francisco.

Enlistments are taken Monday night in the Torrance armory at the ball park.

Southland Wins Treasury Dept. Commendation

"It should be a source of great satisfaction to all Southern Californians to know that the Southland has been commended by the Treasury Department for organizing the first peacetime Payroll Savings Bond Council in the nation."

This statement was made by Hillman R. Lee, now of Las Vegas, former Torrance chairman of the War Finance Committee and now advisor to the Treasury's U.S. Savings Bonds Division.

"The fact that several hundred of the largest industrial concerns, commercial establishments and public employee groups in Southern California have banded together in the Payroll Savings Bond Council, purpose of which will be to make regular bond buying easy for employees, is convincing proof that they consider continued wide distribution of Savings Bonds to be the greatest importance," Lee said.

"Surveys reveal that a majority of employees, many of whom acquired the thrift habit during the war, favor continuation of the payroll savings plan where they work. By their purchases they not only are backing their future, but are helping to ward off inflation. Thus, the value of the program cannot be stressed too much."

In his capacity as advisor to the U.S. Savings Bonds Division, Lee declared that in his opinion the Savings Bonds program should be the Number One project in every community.

"U.S. Savings Bonds are still the best and safest investment in the world," he said.

Small Harbor Committee Is Appointed

Headed by a Southern California chairman, and with heavy representation from the Southern California coastal areas, a statewide small harbor development committee of the California State Chamber of Commerce has been appointed by Dr. Robert Gordon Sprull, chairman of the State Chamber's statewide natural resources committee, to work in promoting a series of small vessel harbors and refuges all along the California coastline.

Hubbard C. Rowe, Newport Beach boatbuilder, and active in the Newport Beach harbor development, is chairman of the committee. Charles A. Winslow, a leader in San Francisco Bay yachting activities, is vice chairman of the committee of fifty members.

Yachtsmen, powerboat owners, commercial fisheries, fishermen's unions, boatbuilders, and city, county and port officials are members of the committee, which was named following request of these groups that the State Chamber create such a group to coordinate establishment of small harbors and assist local communities in this effort. Preliminary studies already are being made by Army engineers between the Mexican line and Monterey County. The pending Rivers and Harbors bill authorizes similar Army engineer studies to the Oregon line, including San Francisco Bay.

Members of the statewide small harbors development committee include the following from Los Angeles County: Morgan Adams and Eugene Overton, Los Angeles Harbor Commission; Harry Bauer, Southern California Edison Co.; Roy Beaton, Southern California Fish Cannery, Inc.; Raymond Darby, county supervisor; Co. Charles T. Leeds, engineer; P. G. Winnett, Bullock's; George Hjelle, Los Angeles recreation director; Richard Loynes, Long Beach Regional Planning Commission; W. E. Martin, Long Beach Board of Harbor Commissioners.

Grant Mortgage Increase For Home Financing

Substantial increases in the maximum permissible amount of mortgages which the FHA may insure under the recently extended "War Housing Insurance" have been granted for the financing of home construction in the Los Angeles insuring office jurisdiction, according to a telegram received today by John E. McGovern, district director, Southern California, Federal Housing Administration.

Effective immediately the FHA commissioner has prescribed a maximum mortgage amount of \$7,500 for the FHA-minimum acceptable three-bedroom, single-family house, including garage; \$11,600 for a two-family residence; \$14,600 for a three-family residence; and \$16,700 for a four-family residence. Changes in mortgage ceilings for one- and two-bedroom residences are still under advisement and will be announced later, McGovern said.

When the War Housing Insurance, Sec. 603 of the National Housing Act was reinstated in May of this year, the ceilings for such mortgage insurance were set at \$5,400 for a single-family residence; \$7,500 for a two-family; \$9,500 for a three-family; or \$12,000 for a four-family residence. These ceilings were set for the nation as a whole, but with the expectation of adjustment where they were not feasible in any certain geographical area to construct residences without sacrifice of sound standards of construction, design, or livability. The current increases represent such an adjustment for the Los Angeles insuring area.

"This action has been taken in an effort to give concrete assistance to builders in developing dwelling units for rent to that large group of veterans who are urgently in need of housing but who are not in position to make a purchase at this time," he concluded.

With his mother's condition much improved, the son, Seaman 1/c Gilbert M. Armstrong, returned to Seattle to rejoin his ship, the USS Alabama.


ASK FACILITIES
