Downing two strong clubs in pre-tournament games during past week, the Torrance American Legion's gussy club loomed high for show honors in the forthcoming event here Aug. 3. The locals snuffed the life out of Club 89 last Thursday night for a 9-2 victory and followed this Sunday by knocking the South West Dodgers for a 5-3 loss.

Both of these clubs are of the 16 teams entered in the Southern California Baseball Tournament to be played in Torrance City park.

In the Club 89 game, Nello Saggiani, a new TAL rubberman, allowed only one hit and no runs during his four innings of play. Nello's smooth curve ball struck out six of the 89's. Little Bob Balcina, another new deal, hurled the remaining five innings and was tagged for four hits and two runs before gaining control of the horsehide.

On the mound for Club 89 were R. Widner and N. Wheatly. Widner was nicked for seven hits and five runs prior to his shower at the end of the fifth. Wheatly, a former Cleveland Indian hurler, allowed the locals to get to him for three hits and four runs.

A TAL rally, started by first baseman Hal Jackson in the third, with the bases loaded, actually started the game-cooling for Torrance when the 89's batted Hal Nello's hard double into right field to bring in two runs.

Sandoval, Jones Get Acid Test Tomorrow Night

Albert (Sandy) Sandoval of Wilmington, one of the most popular young fighters in the Harbor area gets his golden opportunity to step into the big time spotlight when he tackles Richard Jones of Los Angeles in the main event of the amateur boxing show at the Wilmington Bowl tomorrow (Friday) night.

The two boys stand heads and shoulders above the rest of the lightweight crop in Southern California today, and promoters have assured both that the winner will get his long-awaited offer to sign a pro contract.

Both fighters are fast, clever, in good condition and each can punch.

Promoter-matchmaker Joe Craig says the fight should be the best at the Wilmington Bowl since he began staging tightknit bouts, and he fully expects to have the Bowl's first overflow crowd in nearly two decades.

The first preliminary will begin at 8:30 p.m.

'Sweetheart Bill' May Admit 14,000 Female Aliens

The Torrance Area Veterans Service Center has received from Congressman Cecil R. King a copy of the "Sweetheart Bill," approved June 29, 1946. This bill provides that aliens actually engaged to service personnel may enter the United States for three months as visitors. Satisfactory evidence that a bona fide engagement exists must be furnished the American consular office, and a suitable bond must be posted to cover return transportation if the marriage does not take place.

It is estimated that this bill will admit 14,000 aliens, principally from Australia.

The International Institute is now affiliated with this Center, and it has a representative who will assist in the details necessary to the bringing of the alien sweethearts to the United States.

First Round Opponents Decided For Big Baseball Tournament Here

The Los Angeles Cubs and the Club 89 vs. Pacific Standard Oil of El Segundo will start Saturday, Aug. 3, the 30-day Southern California Baseball Tournament in Torrance City park, and nightly games to decide a winner among the 16 entries will follow.

The Standard ball players were eliminated in the final round of the 1945 tournament by Rosabell Plumbers, tournament champs, who are heavy favorites for the forthcoming event. The L. A. Drastic Changes In Vets Insurance May Become Law

Drastic changes in veterans' insurance, made in the bill passed by Congress and awaiting only President Truman's signature to become a law, will affect approximately 350,000 policy holders in Southern California, according to L. C. Chapman, manager Los Angeles Veterans Administration regional office.

The new measure will permit lump sum settlements, endowment features, unrestricted beneficiary designations, disability income and in general make National Service Life Insurance comparable to old line policies.

Chapman said complete information will be given veterans through the press on how, when, and where to make desired changes in their policies if the President signs the bill thereby making it a law.
