Official Army Air Force Day To Be Aug. 1; Big Displays Featured

By official Presidential Proclamation, Aug. 1 has been declared Army Air Forces Day and the proud American public will pay tribute to the thousands of air men, and to teammates who are no longer with them, during the big "open house" at every Army air field in the country. The AAF planes which have broken 20 world's records will be on display at the Army Ferry Command in Long Beach, the AAF announced Tuesday.

Many of the experienced men who played a role in the shattering of the Rhineland or in events leading up to the pulverizing of Nagasaki are still on the AAF team. Others, after a brief absence, have reenlisted and around these veteran air men a new peacetime team is being built. Its "heads up" team playing a technical game of skill, the likes of which the world has never seen.

Army Recruiting NCO Here Is Also Care of Tomato, Marine Corps Vet Is Recommended

Corporal Michael J. Campbell, 29, who holds among other decorations the Purple Heart, Silver Star and Bronze Star, has opened Army recruiting offices in the post office here, where he is on duty five days a week.

Campbell entered the service in July, 1941, at Los Angeles, and nine days later was shipped across the Pacific to the Philippine islands as a member of the famed Co. G, 31st Infantry Division. Following his basic training he was assigned to a group to protect Nichols Field, where he came through the first Nip bombings Dec. 7, 1941. Four days later he was at Bataan, where he fought in four major battles.

During the Mount Sumat battle, which ended April 9, 1942 with the surrender of Bataan, the spunky little corporal spent 23 days with a rifle in his hands battling the Japanese. When told to surrender, along with 13 others, he disobeyed orders and escaped on a small Navy tug to Corregidor. The four mile crossing required eight hours, Campbell said.

On Corregidor he was assigned to the Fourth Marine Regiment and wears the Navy Unit Citation for his service with the group. He remained with the Fourth regiment as a machine gunner until the "Rock" fell May 6, 1942. Campbell was taken prisoner by the Japs, and after spending many months of hardship at Cabanatuan and other prison camps, he was moved to Japan where he also made the rounds of Japan's cruelest camps.

He was liberated in September, 1945, and returned here the following month.

Yes, it was a rough 42 months for Corporal Campbell, but to mention those continuous months of fighting, but somehow he found time after it was over to reenlist in the Army, and is now going after recruits in a big way.

He plans to be married soon to Miss Priscilla Marion of Chicago, Ill., and expects the future Mrs. Campbell here to complete those plans before many days have passed.

LIST POPULAR FLIES—Fishing has been good in Thousand Lake Valley, Shasta County. Fishing is at its best in most streams and lakes in the northern district and limits are common on flies. Most popular types are Queen of the Waters, Grey Hackle, Yellow Body and Brown Hackle.

SAN BERNARDINO REPORTS—Fishing has been rather slow in San Bernardino County, although a few fair catches are taken from Lake Arrowhead and some catches of small trout in Miller Creek and lower Deep Creek.

EASTERN BROOK—Limits of small eastern Brook trout are reported to be easily taken from Clarks Creek, Tulare County. Fishing in the east fork of Kaweah at Mineral King is good, having been stocked last fall with large fish.

Army European Jobs For Former Women Soldiers

Pull out the travel folders and shake out the old duffel bag—it's European travel for free, if you're an ex-Wac.

If you're a former member of the Women's Army Corps and can hold one of nine military classifications, you may reenlist for duty in the European theater, according to Cpl. Michael J. Campbell, recruiting NCO of Army recruiting in Torrance.

The women soldiers needed are: 100 clerk typists, 50 stenographers, 25 clerks general, 25 statistical clerks, 25 teletypewriter operators, 20 cryptographic technicians, and 11 supply clerks.

All applications must be received on or before Aug. 7, 1946, Campbell said.

Experiment on a new safety factor in automobile racing was introduced in the last 500-mile grind at Indianapolis, the car of Emil Andres, which finished fourth, being equipped with two-way radio for communication with the servicing pit. The equipment, weighing less than 50 pounds, was powered by the same "Mini-Max" "B" batteries used in camera-type personal radio sets and which proved so successful during the war in operating the Navy's sonobuoys for spotting submarines.

BOILED FISH

For broiled fish at its best, use moderate heat, placing the fish about six inches away from the broiler. No extra fat is used with oily fish, but lean fish is rubbed with margarine or bacon dripping before broiling.

Medicine Lake, Siskiyou County, is reported number one fishing spot of that county. Orr Lake rates as second spot, with Antelope and Bear Creeks both good and Butte Creek ranking poor.
