NOTICE OF SALE OF \$150,000 BONDS MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT NO. 1 OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that sealed proposals for the purchase of \$150,000 par value bonds of Municipal Water District No. 1 of the City of Torrance, California, will be received at the office of the City Clerk of said city in the City Hall thereof up to the hour of 7:45 o'clock P.M., August 27, 1946.

Said bonds are to be issued under an Act of the Legislature of the State of California approved April 26, 1936, Stats. 1936, p. 423, and commonly known as the Municipal Water District Law of 1935.

The bonds to be sold are 150 in number, numbered 1 to 150, inclusive, of the denomination of \$1000 each, to be dated August 1, 1946, and to be payable in consecutive numerical order, five (5) bonds annually from August 1, 1950 to August 1, 1979, both inclusive.

Said bonds are to bear interest at a rate to be determined upon the basis thereof, but not to exceed six percent (6%) per annum, payable semiannually. The bonds are payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the City Treasurer of the City of Torrance, California.

Each bid shall state that the bidder offers par and accrued interest to date of delivery, the premium, if any, and the interest rate or rates not to exceed six percent (6%) per annum, payable semiannually, at which the bidder offers to buy said bonds. Said rate or rates must be in multiples of 1/4 of 1% (1/4%). Not more than two interest rates may be bid. No bond shall bear more than one interest rate.

No bid for a part of said bonds will be considered. The bonds shall be sold for cash only and for not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery.

A certified or cashier's check on a responsible bank or trust company, in the amount of three percent (3%) of the principal amount of the bonds, payable to the order of the City of Torrance must accompany each bid. The bidder, if successful, will accept and pay for said bonds in accordance with the terms of his bid. The proceeds of the check accompanying any accepted proposal shall be applied on the purchase price, or, if such proposal is accepted but not performed, unless such failure of performance shall be caused by any act or omission of the City of Torrance, shall then be retained by the City. The check accompanying each unaccepted proposal will be returned promptly.

The opinion of O'Melvey & Myers, attorneys, approving the validity of said bonds, will be furnished the successful bidder at no expense to the bidder. Payment for and delivery of said bonds shall be made in the office of the City Treasurer of the City of Torrance.

The City Council reserves the right to reject any or all bids or to waive any irregularity or informality in any bid.

The bids will be opened at the meeting of the City Council to be held Tuesday, August 27, 1946, at 7:45 o'clock P.M., in the Council Chambers in the City Hall.

(Continued from Page 1-A) district and maintain the present municipal government setup before the city government was formed. Therefore, only two steps were open to Torrance. One was to write and adopt a City Charter providing for continuance of the present city officials, ordinances, civil service rights, etc., and provide also for the election of the Torrance Board of Education. The other would be to vote to become a Fifth Class City. The Fifth Class City automatically gets jurisdiction of its own schools, but it changes the municipal government setup radically. Fifth Class cities and sixteenth class cities are bound by the Municipal Code of California and can act only in accordance with the code. Charter cities, such as Torrance will be, are governed by the desires of the people of the city, and they may amend the charter from time to time as the city grows, and keep abreast of the times. All agree that the City Charter is the modern method of municipal government. To keep controversial subjects out of the school campaign, the Torrance City Charter has been written to preserve the city government as it is now, and to provide for the control by the people of Torrance of the schools of Torrance. After it is ratified by the legislature, which is automatic, the charter can be amended to provide for election of the Council by Wards, for City Manager form of government or for whatever the majority of the people want. They are the rulers.

5000 New Home Units Allowed

A supplemental quota of 5,000 dwelling units has been assigned to the local FHA office for the issuance of HH Preference Ratings for the construction of new dwelling units to be reserved for veteran occupancy, according to a telegram received from the Washington office of the FHA by John E. McGovern, director for the Southern California District, Federal Housing Administration. The 5,000 units is in addition to the quota of 6,738 which had been previously assigned to this district for the month of August, but which had been exhausted through the large volume of applications received previous to its becoming effective, making it necessary for the FHA to refuse to accept applications during the month of July, McGovern said.
