# Responsibilities Of Various School Agencies Told

A full time director for the Southern California area has been appointed by Church World Service, international Protestant relief agency now engaged in collecting food, clothing and medicine for shipment overseas, it was disclosed yesterday by the Rev. Hubert C. Noble, chaplain of Occidental college and head of the area committee.

The new director is Palmer Van Gundy, who until recently was located at Fresno as San Joaquin Valley director for the National Conference of Christians and Jews. Van Gundy, an ex-GI who served nearly three years in the Army, has his headquarters in the Los Angeles Church Federation building.

According to the Rev. Mr. Noble, Van Gundy's appointment is expected to facilitate the donations of food and clothing among Southern California churches. A collection depot is maintained for the convenience of Southern California churches at 7110 Compton ave., Los Angeles.

The Federal government is not concerned except as it has assisted districts greatly affected by the war impact by way of giving financial assistance to some operating with a budget deficit.

2. Employment. The district employs teachers. The county superintendent of schools verifies that all teachers so employed are properly credentialed. The state issues credentials to prospective teachers. The federal government is not concerned in this regard.

The district does the actual teaching. The county superintendent of schools provides a course of study for non-city elementary school districts. However, the state requires various subjects to be included in the course of study and more or less determines the general educational pattern for elementary grades by supplying free textbooks.

The Federal government is not concerned except in giving financial assistance to school districts by way of encouraging such programs as Smith-Hughes and George Deen classes, etc.

The chart endeavors to show the interjurisdictional relationships of the federal government, state, county and school districts regarding public education. The following examples are indicative of these interjurisdictional relationships:

1. Budgetary. A school district adopts a budget, the county superintendent of schools checks the budget for legal requirements and accuracy and files it with the County Board of Supervisors, who in turn fix the tax rate.

The state enacts laws fixing the maximum tax rate which may be levied by school districts and provides uniform budgetary forms and accounting procedures.
