Adventists In Camp In Lynwood

"If Hitler might have been won for Christ while a confused lad suffering from an inferiority complex in Austria, what that might have meant to the world," so spoke Missionary Henry F. Brown before several thousand now congregated this week at the Seventh-day Adventist camp meeting in Lynwood, just south of Los Angeles.

Brown, who now heads Adventist home mission work, is a native of Southern California, born in Glendora and educated in Long Beach and San Fernando. He has traveled for Adventist missions in more than 40 countries and spent a mission term in South America and another in southern Europe and northern Africa.

The camp closes Sunday, August 25. Meetings are held beginning at 6 a.m. and continuing through the day, ending with the 7:30 evangelistic meeting conducted by the London famous evangelist, R. Allen Anderson.

"The Adventist church is endeavoring to give a new interpretation of the word 'Christianity,'" explained Brown. "In an effort to satisfy the needs of the starved population of Europe, Adventists have sent over one million dollars worth of clothing to thirty European countries. And \$735,000 has been expended for food and is being shipped by truck from Denmark into Germany, Greece, Czechoslovakia, Austria and Hungary. In addition to the many tons sent, individuals have sent more than seventy tons of eleven-pound packages."

Brown, who now is the denomination's associate home missionary secretary in Washington, D. C., stated that the failure of the church to win the individual to the Christian way of life has cost the world much blood.
