**Lomita Area Zone Change Asked By Co. Supervisors**

The Board of Supervisors at its Tuesday meeting, on motion of Supervisor Raymond V. Darby, and in response to a petition presented by residents in the vicinity of Narbonne ave. in Lomita, requested the County Counsel to prepare an urgency ordinance placing the property bounded on the north by 250th st., on the east by Oak st., on the south by 255th st. and on the west by Cypress ave. in an A-1 zone, being light agricultural and residential.

**Col. Williams is Cited With Legion Of Merit Honor**

To it. This section has been a prototype upon which Aircraft Maintenance Sections of other Air Transport Command Divisions have been organized.

"Colonel Williams initiated a program of putting into actual successful practice modern theories of utilization of manpower, equipment and facilities. This program consisted of established standard maintenance procedure throughout the Division and utilization of manpower. By means of this program, the Alaskan Division expanded its missions of transport of personnel and material and processing of lend-lease aircraft by assuming the added responsibility of modification programs on C-54 and C-47 aircraft for other Air Transport Command Divisions. This additional work was performed very successfully at the 1455th AAF Base Unit, A7C, East Base, Great Falls, Montana, in addition to their mission of staging and processing lend-lease aircraft for delivery to the final processing center at Ladd Field and thence to be turned over to the U.S.S.R. representative."

"Colonel Williams has carried forward the duty upon which this recommendation is based to an exceptional degree in the accomplishment of the mission of the Alaskan Division, Air Transport Command."

Awards previously made to the colonel are:

Medal of the Year, (Pope Plus), on the basis of recognition of the aircraft flight from New York to Rome, July, 1929; Gold Medal of the Minister of Aeronautics of Italy; Grand Master of the Order of the Legion of Merit, Italy, 1934.

Army Air Forces, Army Commendation Ribbon, by direction of the Secretary of War, April 2, 1944, signed by Lt. Gen. N. F. Twining, commanding general, Air Materiel Command.

Army Air Forces, Certificate of Appreciation for War Service, signed by H. H. Arnold, Commanding General, Army Air Forces.

**South Lomita Storm Drainage Plan Dropped**

According to Supervisor Raymond V. Darby, a report to the supervisors in response to its recent request for a study on the method and feasibility of financing and constructing the South Lomita Drainage System indicates that even were the financing available the construction of the system at this time is not feasible due to the large amount of erosion from parts of the tributary water shed.

At the present time the State Highway Department finds it necessary to remove many tons of eroded material from the Pacific Coast Highway after any considerable storm and if the drainage system were constructed this material would be carried into the drain and have to be removed at a much greater cost. For that reason, until development of the area has stabilized the material subject to erosion, it would not be advisable to construct the South Lomita Drainage System.

**BARNETT ASKED TO PREPARE FIGURES ON NEW DISTRICT**

Harold A. Barnett was retained by the City Council to prepare preliminary plans and assessment estimates leading to the formation of a special assessment district in Vista Highlands to perform necessary street and sidewalk work and provide street lighting.

The area is bounded by Carson st., Torrance blvd., west of Crenshaw blvd., and preliminary work will cost \$3.00 an hour for office procedure and \$64 a day for field work.

Dr. Frank O. Evans, of the Los Angeles schools, told members that a school "definitely is slated for the community and that the type of school will depend upon the number of students to be benefited."

He revealed that as soon as Torrance elementary and high schools open this fall, the city will make a survey of the number of shoestring students enrolled and base the size of the proposed structure on this count.

The new Torrance school district to coincide with the limits of the City of Torrance.

In selecting the high school district, it is expected that Redondo Beach Union high school district will be picked due to the widespread sympathy with the policy of the beach district and the fine reputation for scholastic achievement possessed by the district.

In addition to having the advantage of the Redondo Beach district's administration, supervision and teaching in the interim before formation of the Torrance city school district and the Torrance unified school district, the people of Torrance, in selecting the beach district, automatically will join the new Centinela-Bay Cities junior college district for at least a year after formation of the Torrance city school district which will have control only of the elementary schools in that period. Upon formation of the Torrance unified school district, Torrance will have control of all its education facilities from kindergarten through high school, as of July 1, 1948, it is pointed out.

It will be necessary, under the law, for Torrance to join the Redondo Beach district or remain in the Los Angeles high school district for at least a year after formation of the Torrance city school district which will have control only of the elementary schools in that period. Upon formation of the Torrance unified school district, Torrance will have control of all its education facilities from kindergarten through high school, as of July 1, 1948, it is pointed out.

**Eye Defects Are Discussed By Health Doctor**

Many a child has received poor grades in school not because of his inability to learn but because of defective eyesight. Eyes cannot be healthy in a body that is sick, and likewise when eyes are tired, the body becomes tired.

Children have strong focusing muscles in their eyes but if there is a large amount of farsightedness they need glasses which will do the focusing for them and give their eyes a rest. If nearsighted, eyes are already focused for nearby objects they become lazy and unhealthy unless they get the proper amount of focusing exercise.

"Cross-eye" is another kind of eye strain which needs the careful attention of an eye physician in order to avoid permanent injury to the afflicted eye. Eyes should be kept clean by frequent face washing. "Eye washes" are not necessary. Dirty fingers and soiled tissues should be kept away from eyes. Children should be discouraged from reading while on the floor. Good reading habits call for a good light of about 80-100 watts, about three feet behind and to one side of the printed page which is held about 18 inches from the eyes.

Many diseases of the eyes do not manifest themselves until they have progressed far enough to cut down the vision, and for this reason it is best to have periodic eye examinations, especially in childhood and middle age.

**INCOME AND FOOD**  
High incomes and good eating habits do not necessarily go hand in hand. The U. S. Department of Labor points out that milk consumption per capita at the \$2,000 income level per family was fully as high as at the \$4,000 level.
