**RED CROSS BLOOD
DONOR PROGRAM
EXPANDED HERE**

More than \$40,000 worth of whole blood for transfusions use in veterans' and civilian hospitals has been collected and delivered by Los Angeles Red Cross in the first 6-months operation of the Blood Donor Center here.

William T. Sesson Jr., chairman of the local Red Cross chapter, disclosed this fact as he computed the pints directed free of charge to Birmingham General hospital in Van Nuys, San Fernando Veterans and the Los Angeles County General hospital.

"Volunteer donations of whole blood made by 1,735 contributors—if determined at the commercial rate of \$25 per pint—sets the saving to the hospitals served, at \$43,395," Sesson said. "This does not include the saving in time of the patients' use of equipment and supplies in obtaining whole blood in the hospitals' own blood banks."

Emphasizing the need of more donors to operate this vital program, Sesson disclosed that Red Cross will expand its blood delivery program by adding Sawtelle Veterans' Administration to the list of recipients.

All types of blood can be utilized, it was explained. Donors can make appointments by phoning the Blood Donor Center, 549 South Olive st., Mutual 2301. The center is open daily, except Saturday and Sunday, from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m.

**L. A. RED CROSS
"MOST ECONOMICAL"
CHAPTER IN NATION**

Thousands of hard-working volunteers—working on assignments night and day—enabled Los Angeles to become "the most economically operated Red Cross chapter in the United States last year."

Bowen McCoy, local chapter manager, so informed members of the board of directors of the mercy organization this week.

"Although Los Angeles Red Cross' expenditures to carry on its varied services in this area in 1945 was topped only by Chicago and New York, the salaries in percent of total costs was 16 on the list of 16 major chapters in the country," McCoy declared.

"This economical record is due largely to the splendid services turned in by our volunteers on assignment in all corps and departments," McCoy pointed out.

While Red Cross services to men in the armed forces in this locale "naturally decreased since V-J day, the organization's program among the discharged veterans has tripled," the chapter manager said. In August of 1945, for example, the Home Service department aided 1,053 veterans. The month of July of 1946 found 3,226 veterans assisted here, his report revealed.

At the same time, McCoy told the directors, meeting for the first time since their election last June, of the "large-scale volunteer recruitment program to be launched next month to meet increasing needs for service from Veterans' Administration, as well as to adequately carry out the Red Cross' community obligations in civilian hospital wards here."

"To equal our 1945 operating cost of services, Los Angeles must again throw the brunt of its expanding programs on the shoulders of its faithful volunteer workers," McCoy concluded.

William T. Sesson Jr., chapter chairman, presided over the meeting.


