Quail Population Increase Possible In New Proposal

California's population of valley quail can be increased sufficiently to yield a safe annual harvest of from 20 to 30 birds per hundred acres of range by application of range management principles detailed in a report issued by the University of California College of Agriculture.

An eight-year study of ways to protect and increase California's favorite game bird was under the direction of Dr. Tracy I. Storer, professor of zoology in the College of Agriculture on the Davis campus of the University.

Results of the study are given in bulletin 695 of the College of Agriculture, titled "Increasing Valley Quail in California." The publication may be obtained free from the Public Service Office, College of Agriculture, Berkeley, or from the office of any farm advisor.

Sewer Petition For Area East Of Torrance Okayed

On motion of Supervisor Raymond V. Darby, the Board of Supervisors at its Tuesday meeting authorized the circulation of a petition for sanitary sewers in Bolsa st., located between Davidson City and Torrance, and required that petition be returned to the Board with the signatures of owners of not less than 60% of the area of the proposed district on or before Nov. 1, 1946.

The estimated cost of the improvement is \$6,320. The cost of the main line sewer per assessable front foot is estimated at \$2.59 and the estimated cost of house connection constructed to curb line is \$50.40. The total assessed valuation of the district is \$4,042, of which amount \$3,270 represents land valuation and the balance is made up of improvements in the sum of \$1,520 and secured personal property of \$152.

OPA Warns GI House Buyers To Be Sure To Have Land Before Purchase

Memo to Southland GI's from OPA seeking eviction of their tenants so that they can move the structure they generally find more sympathetic to their problems and grant the eviction certificates.

3. Except in unusual circumstances, eviction petitions from landlords in this type of case are denied since it is usually difficult for the landlord to show that his actions are not aimed at circumvention of the rent regulation.

Motive of the sellers, according to Ben C. Koepke, Southland rent director for OPA, is anything but obscure. "A vacant lot in many cases—particularly in commercial zones—will bring a much higher price than would the lot with a dwelling on it," he declared. "Good business locations are very much in demand."

Koepke said that all veterans or others contemplating the purchase of houses separately and without the lot, with the intention of moving them, should check with OPA if a tenant is involved.

1. OPA considers the owner of the lot, itself, as the landlord and, as such, he—not the GI house-buyer—is the proper party to petition for the tenants' eviction.
