**Govt. To Reexamine Necessity Plea Of Commercial Builders**

As the result of a government-wide decision to tighten controls on non-housing construction, Louis M. Dreves of Los Angeles, regional director of the Civilian Production Administration, has instructed his staff in Southern California, Arizona and Utah to immediately extend every effort to reduce the amount of industrial, commercial and institutional construction approvals by 25 percent.

This will add several million dollars of proposed building to the backlog of non-housing construction in one of the most rapidly expanding population areas in the United States.

This new cut in approvals, the first since May 29, means that interpretations of criteria upon which approvals have been made must be revamped, Dreves disclosed.

The hardship criteria, which has been subject to widespread criticism on the housing front, is one of the first to be revamped.

"The plea of hardship by an applicant," Dreves explained, "will not be appropriate except on a showing that other facilities are not available for sale or rent and that every effort has been made to find alternate facilities."

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Mr. Dreves for a high percentage of hardship approvals. Business expansion plans suffer severely under this new reduction, Dreves revealed in announcing that applications based on inadequacy of space and facilities due to increased sales must be excluded from favorable consideration.

Approval of applications on the "public health and safety" criteria must be directly related to the objective, it was said. Where the relationship is of minor nature rather than major the criteria will not apply.

Dreves reported that public safety and health construction will be kept at a bare, absolute minimum.

The "increased food production" criteria now is to be restricted to those projects primarily and directly supporting this activity. Merc warehouses to store food no longer is considered construction to increase food production, Dreves said.

In applications concerning the production of critical products, Civilian Production will continue to assist, whenever possible, manufacturers in producing critical materials for the housing program.

The national goal is to cut weekly approvals from \$48,000,000 to \$35,000,000.
