SOLUTION TO MAJOR SEWER NEEDS OF TORRANCE AREAS POSSIBLE WITH STATE FUNDS

Solution to the major sewer problems of three sections of Torrance may be possible under the allocations of \$88,376 to this city from the funds voted by the California Legislature under the California Construction and Employment act, it appeared this week.

The state money must be matched by city funds, and sewer trunk lines are given first priority on the money.

The \$88,376 is too much to pass up and will be matched, city authorities agreed, and sewer trunk lines probably will take all of the fund because of the vastness of the area of Torrance.

That County Sanitation District No. 5 and Los Angeles County general funds might be used in connection with the state money was indicated, in that the sanitation district, to serve certain sections of its area, must provide mains which traverse Torrance city area.

One such main the sanitation district proposes to construct, would pass along 182nd street. This automatically would serve the North Torrance area in the vicinity of El Mido, Prairie avenue and Crenshaw Blvd., it is said.

Already the city has allocated some \$4500 of this money to the sanitation district to extend trunk lines in the Lomita area, which ultimately will serve the Walteria and Southwest Torrance section.

While North Torrance and the Walteria area together with Hollywood Riviera long have sought sewers, the most critical Torrance problem is in South Torrance, where each winter the rains experience difficulties with cesspools.

It is felt that with the cooperation of the County Sanitation district, the city and state matching funds will eliminate most of the sewer problems of the Torrance area by providing the trunk lines to take the sewage away from various districts. Residents are willing to provide assessment districts for the laterals, information coming to the council meetings indicate.

The possibility that other nearby cities with sewer problems will aid in the over-all picture, coordinated by the County Sanitation district, loomed since the state asks that the funds

be used first for sewer trunk lines.

Allocations to other nearby cities which might join in the over-all sewer development, together with county territories for which state money also has been provided, are: Compton, \$145,284; El Segundo, \$33,201; Gardena, \$52,484; Hawthorne, \$73,392; Hermosa Beach, \$68,924; Palos Verdes Estates, \$8,767; Redondo Beach, \$116,284.

Under the terms of the act, \$90,000,000 is appropriated to the cities and counties throughout the state on a matching basis; a county may apply for funds for road and highway construction projects up to an aggregate of \$75,000 without matching.

One-third of the total county allocation is for the state's share of cost of rights of way for roads and highways in unincorporated territory; two-thirds is to be used for construction in which there is a state interest, e.g., hospitals and sanatoriums, detention homes, schools, roads, highways, tubes, bridges, flood control projects, fire prevention and protection, sewage, sanitation, harbor, and veterans' facilities. First use of city funds is for sewage projects, and funds not required for sewage facilities can be expended for construction of major streets, schools, storm drains, improvement of existing publicly-owned waterworks, and veterans' facilities.

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


