Appointment of Joseph E. Havenner as manager of the public safety department of the Automobile Club of California was announced by Standish L. Mitchell, general manager of the organization. Havenner fills the post left by the death of E. B. Leferts, for 26 years manager of the department, Aug. 16 while on a vacation trip.

Havenner was educated in Los Angeles, attending Garfield high school and Los Angeles City college. After two years on the Colorado river aqueduct project, he attended Oregon State college, graduating in 1940 with a B. S. degree in civil engineering. He won a Yale scholarship in traffic engineering at the Yale Bureau of Highway Research, and upon completion of the course came to the Auto Club as traffic engineer.

Havenner joined the U. S. Naval Civil Engineering Corps in 1942, serving with the 14th Construction Battalion on Guadalcanal until hospitalized with malaria. Later he returned to duty as public works officer with the Amphibious Forces of the Pacific at Port Hueneme.

Upon his return to the Auto Club in November, 1945, he began a study on "Staggered Hours" for the Metropolitan Traffic and Transit Committee, which has just been completed.
