

### Red Cross To Spend 16 Million Dollars On Overseas Programs

Red Cross will expend \$16,272,000 on its overseas club and recreation program during the current fiscal year in the new cooperative project arranged with the War Department.

Requests for Red Cross service in the Hawaiian Islands—to servicemen, veterans and their families and to civilians—have resulted in an expanding program. William B. Rinehart, director of Home Service department for the Hawaii chapter, so revealed this week as he visited local Red Cross officials enroute to national headquarters in Washington, D. C.

"Our programs daily are being geared more and more to the pre-war service to the community," Rinehart declared, "but still performing a big job with the occupational forces and their families; hospitalized and discharged veterans."

The Hawaiian Red Cross leader predicted that "the accelerated Red Cross program will continue for at least another five years — not only in key chapters across the nation, but in all communities housing a Red Cross headquarters."
