Evangelical Group To Read Bible In Year

"Through the Bible In a Year!" This is the watchword of members and friends of Central Evangelical Church participating in a course of Bible reading designed to read the entire Bible within a year. Enrollments in the course are now being taken. Those enrolled purpose to follow the daily reading assignments, and in return will receive monthly or bi-monthly Bible lessons which, when completed, will constitute a Bible handbook of approximately 150 pages.

The handbook is being prepared by the pastor, the Rev. H. Wesley Roloff. It includes an introduction to the Bible, helps on Bible study, an outline of Bible books, notes and comments on the Bible text, a summary of outstanding truths and lasting values of each Bible book and other matter to lend interest and insight to the Bible reading.

In addition to the daily Bible reading and handbook, the minister will preach each Sunday morning from some portion of the scripture read during the previous week. The Wednesday evening prayer service will also be devoted to a review of the week's reading and an answering of special questions that may be raised by the reading.

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Increased Volume Reduces Air Mail Unit Rate Oct. 1

The Post Office Department reports, "The demand for air mail service has continually increased since its inauguration many years ago. With diminishing unit operation costs due to a greater volume of business, the Congress has seen fit to lower the air mail unit rate from 8c to 5c, a reduction of 37 1/2%, effective Oct. 1, 1946. The same rate reduction applies to parcels."

Postmaster C. Earl Conner stated today, "While it is true prices in general have been on the increase, it must be remembered that the mail service is non-profit. As the volume grows, unit costs decrease. The use of air mail will rise to new heights with this great reduction. The use of the new postal insurance is also wise economy—up to \$5 in value for only 3c."

Over the many years, services have been maintained, improved and extended; yet the Post Office Department has consistently followed the policy of extending to the public through rate reductions, the savings resulting from their increasing use of postal facilities.

Famed Battalion Of Nisei Heroes To Return Here

An undisclosed number of Nisei war heroes, who were born and raised on the farmlands of the Palos Verdes hills, are expected to occupy 250 acres of cultivated land there Oct. 1. The Palos Verdes Corp. announced last week.

Kelvin C. Vanderlip, president of the Palos Verdes Corp., said that members of the famed battalion of American-born Japanese who fought in the Italian campaign and who were reviewed by President Truman, will lease property now held by the San Diego Fruit and Produce Co. after that company's lease expiration date, Sept. 30.

George Ishibashi is the only returned Nisei now working on the land, Vanderlip said.
