**GI Art Exhibit Moves Into L.A. Art Gallery**

A total of 81 outstanding selections from the G.I. Art Exhibit which closed Sept. 9 at the Los Angeles County Museum will be placed on view at the Los Angeles city library art gallery until Sept. 30.

This new G.I. art exhibit will include fine arts, prints, photography, cartooning, commercial art, costume design, crafts, industrial art, interior decoration and sculpturing.

This arrangement, made in cooperation with the Veterans Administration, enables works selected by the Los Angeles county museum art division to be brought to the attention of many who have been unable to visit the museum showing. Public interest in the G.I. art exhibit is indicated by the fact that over 60,000 people visited the museum during the month of August, a five-year record. Works on display at the city library will be for sale and many G.I. artists will be available for commercial assignments.

**Will Establish 39 Electronic Co's. For Navy**

Plans for the establishment of 39 Electronics Warfare Companies and 144 Electronics Warfare Platoons within the 11th Naval District have been announced by Lieutenant Commander Leonard E. McKellar, USNR, Communication and Electronics Officer in the office of the district director Naval Reserve, 11th Naval District.

Utilizing the most modern communication equipment, the companies and platoons will be manned by Reserve officers, Naval veterans holding radio, radar, sonar, signal or electronic ratings, and by members of V-6 who are interested in communications. Supervised by brigade headquarters to be established at San Diego with alternate brigade headquarters at Los Angeles and Tucson, the companies and platoons will copy an automatic Fox Broadcast from brigade and alternate brigade stations. In time of earthquake, flood or other extreme emergency these stations would be invaluable in bringing assistance to stricken areas.

While battalion stations will be located in the Naval Reserve armories being established in the larger cities, volunteer Electronics Warfare Companies will be set up in localities located at too great a distance from battalion headquarters for members to travel to the armory for drill. These separated divisions will be located in smaller armories and will conduct volunteer drill under officer supervision following the same general training program as the battalion.

**Reconstruction And Reemployment Commission List Trade Activities**

The first of a new series of reports by the State Reconstruction and Reemployment Commission on California trade activities shows:

1—that the number of trade outlets in the state reached an all-time high in July, 1946.

2—that the value of taxable retail sales for the first quarter of this year was greater than for any previous first quarter.

3—that expenditures by the people of California during the first quarter of 1946 probably exceeded their total disposable income received in that period.

The report, prepared in collaboration with the State Board of Equalization, presents the number of retail outlets of various types, and their taxable sales in relation to population and income level for each county.

Other highlights of the report are:


The number of trade outlets licensed by the State Board of Equalization on July 1, was 231,625, an increase of 25,000 over the prewar peak reached in 1941.

In spite of this increase, the number of outlets for each thousand population is now 25, or four less than the prewar ratio of 29. This is attributed to the increase in population since 1940. The report points out that approximately 35,000 additional establishments would be required to restore the prewar ratio of outlets to population.


Taxable retail sales for the first quarter of 1946 totaled \$1,827,178,080 as compared with \$844,443,513 for the first quarter of 1941.

**Veterans Affairs Department Pays Off Obligations**

"While other states have provided veterans with a cash bonus that was soon dissipated, did little real good and burdened the taxpayers with an outlay of millions in capital and interest, California's Veterans' Farm and Home Purchase Act has already provided lasting benefits to its returning sons and daughters at no cost to the taxpayer."

So declared Ed W. Bolt, chairman of the Veterans' Homes and Farms Committee, today in urging a "yes" vote on Proposition No. 1 at the Nov. 5 election. Proposition No. 1 would provide a \$100,000,000 state bond issue to continue long-term, low-cost financing of the Veterans' Farm and Home Purchase Act in accordance with California's pledge to its veterans.

Already, the framers of this act have saved the people of the State of California the principal sum of \$35,000,000 in addition to the interest, Bolt pointed out.

"The State Department of Veterans' Affairs has always been self-supporting and the chairman and members of the Veterans' Board, who have been appointed by the governors from time to time during the last 26 years, have set up rules and regulations for efficiency and economy which have not only made it possible to pay all operating expenses without cost to the taxpayers, but they have also established a state department that has no equal so far as economical administration is concerned," Bolt continued.

Previous bond issues now have been exhausted, Bolt pointed out, necessitating this new issue on Proposition No. 1, if California is to continue carrying out its pledge to provide much-needed farms and homes for its veterans.
