Dairy Industry Meeting Called

All dairymen and distributors of milk and dairy products in Los Angeles county have been urged to attend a tri-county, industry-wide meeting called by Director of Agriculture A. A. Brock at Norwalk next Wednesday Oct. 2, at 10:30 a.m., in the Excelsior Union high school auditorium, according to Ned M. Clinton of Hynes, prominent dairyman and vice-chairman of the California Dairy Industry Advisory Board.

Many Groups In Support Of New School Measure

The addition this week of 22 new groups to the already impressive list of organizations that have officially endorsed Proposition No. 3—which guarantees a \$2400 yearly salary to California's school teachers—was announced recently by the California Council of Education.

NOTICE OF SALE OF \$150,000 BONDS MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT NO. 1 OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that sealed proposals for the purchase of \$150,000 par value bonds of Municipal Water District No. 1 of the City of Torrance, California, will be received at the office of the City Clerk of said city in the City Hall thereof up to the hour of 7:45 o'clock p.m., October 8, 1946.

Said bonds are to be issued under an Act of the Legislature of the State of California approved April 26, 1935, Stats. 1935, p. 423, and commonly known as the Municipal Water District Law of 1935.

The bonds to be sold are 150 in number, numbered 1 to 150, inclusive of the denomination of \$1,000 each, to be dated August 1, 1946, and to be payable in consecutive numerical order, five (5) bonds annually from August 1, 1950 to August 1, 1970, both inclusive. Said bonds are to bear interest at a rate to be determined upon the sale thereof.

The bonds shall be payable semi-annually. The bonds are payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the City Treasurer of the City of Torrance, California.

Each bid shall state that the bidder offers par and accrued interest to date of delivery, the premium, if any, and the interest rate or rates not to exceed six percent (6%) per annum, payable semi-annually, at which the bidder offers to buy said bonds. Said rate or rates must be in multiples of 1/4 of 1% (1/4%). Not more than two interest rates may be bid. No bond shall bear more than one interest rate. No bid for a part of said bonds will be considered.

The bonds shall be sold for cash only and for not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery.

A certified or cashier's check on a responsible bank or trust company, in the amount of three percent (3%) of the principal amount of the bonds, payable to the order of the City of Torrance must accompany each bid. It is a condition of the bid that the bidder, if successful, will accept and pay for said bonds in accordance with the terms of his bid. The proceeds of the check accompanying any accepted proposal shall be applied on the purchase price, or, if such proposal is accepted but not performed, unless such failure of performance shall be caused by any act or omission of the City of Torrance, shall then be retained by the City. The check accompanying each unaccepted proposal will be returned promptly.

The opinion of O'Melveny & Myers, attorneys, approving the validity of said bonds, will be furnished the successful bidder at no expense to the bidder.

Payment for and delivery of said bonds shall be made in the office of the City Treasurer of the City of Torrance.

The City Council reserves the right to reject any or all bids or to waive any irregularity or informality in any bid.

The bids will be opened at the meeting of the City Council to be held Tuesday, October 8, 1946, at 7:45 o'clock p.m., in the Council Chambers in the City Hall.
