

Caldwell Urges Fight For Vets' Housing Rights

The "emergency" in veterans' housing is assuming "disaster" proportions, warned the Torrance area Veterans Service Center yesterday.

Pressure for that home the GI's fought for and are entitled to will grow for the next few years, stated J. G. Campbell, center director, citing the results of a recent survey. One third of the cross-section of veterans interviewed at the center during a month's period expect to build within the next five years. Tremendous influx of veterans to this area makes housing more critical every day. National and local attention has not taken into consideration this tremendous daily in-migration, Caldwell said. Non-essential commercial constructions must be immediately curtailed, but a long-range program must also be developed to take care of the continued demand.

The center survey, started by the AFL Rehabilitation Office in the center, with the cooperation of the other 17 member organizations, also revealed that only 7 percent are building at present. Another 7 percent of the veterans interviewed owned their homes.

Caldwell pointed out that these figures, coupled with the immediate need for 135,000 homes in Los Angeles estimated by the Citizens' Housing Council, show that this problem is
