

N. Torrance Sewer Project Reaches Planning Stage; Joint Aid Available

Sewers will be available to North Torrance residents in the near future if property owners there want them, and a great part of the cost will be borne by various government agencies.

This was revealed by Acting Mayor W. H. Tolson, who said that he had conferred with A. M. Rawn, chief engineer of the County Sanitation districts, and had been told that if the City of Torrance will work out legal and engineering details of planning and bonding for its share of the work, the County Sanitation districts will do the rest.

The area proposed to be served by the county is bounded on the south by 190th st., on the east by Arlington ave., on the north by 174th st. and on the west by Hawthorne blvd. County territory west of Hawthorne blvd. also would be included in the project.

There is a 62-inch sewer trunk on Arlington ave., and it is proposed to construct another trunk on 182nd st., from Arlington ave. westerly to Hawthorne blvd. and the county area.

Assisting in the cost of the proposed sewer development would be the County Sanitation department, the State of California and the City of Torrance, through use of part of the \$89,000 "matching money" available to this city from the state.

It is probable that the district will be formed by posting of notices and holding of protest meetings. Sentiment in North Torrance is said to be overwhelmingly in favor of a sewer project.

Tolson said that he had been asked by Mayor J. Hugh Sherry Jr. to steer the city's course in forming the new district.

Uniform Curfew Urged For County Municipalities

A resolution calling on the Board of Supervisors for all municipalities in the county to adopt a uniform curfew law was voted Thursday by the Los Angeles County Youth Committee at its monthly session at the Hall of Records.

The measure desired by the committee would ban loitering on the streets after 10 p.m. by youths under 18 years of age.

The committee is composed of county and city officials concerned with the problems of youth and ways and means of reducing juvenile delinquency in the area.

Torrance Police Chief John Stroh said yesterday that he was in favor of the uniform curfew law which would allow better enforcement.

Curfew "rings" in Torrance at 10 p.m. for up to 16-year-olds, but is not rigidly enforced for older juveniles.

ORDINANCE NO. 376
AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO PACIFIC ELECTRIC RAILWAY COMPANY, A CORPORATION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, THE RIGHT TO CONSTRUCT, MAINTAIN, AND OPERATE A SPUR OR TEAM TRACK UPON AND ACROSS THE WEST ROADWAY OF FERROCARRIL AVENUE IN THE CITY OF TORRANCE, CALIFORNIA.

The City Council of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

SECTION I. That the right be and the same is hereby granted to Pacific Electric Railway Company, a corporation, its successors and assigns, to construct and for a period of fifty years to maintain and operate a spur or team track upon and across the west roadway of Ferrocarril Avenue, over the route described as follows, to-wit:

Beginning at a point in the east line of the west roadway of Ferrocarril (Lot R-2 Tract No. 1427) distant southerly thereon 596.08 feet from the southerly line of 220th Street (60 feet wide) thence northwesterly along a curve concave to the southwest and having a radius of 558.39 feet, a distance of 40.56 feet to end of said curve; thence continuing northwesterly tangent to said curve a distance of 14.68 feet to a point in the west line of the west roadway of Ferrocarril, distant southerly thereon 544.27 feet from the southerly line of 220th Street.

SECTION II. Said grantee, its successors and assigns, shall use in the construction of said work the best material, including standard grooved girder-rails weighing not less than 128 pounds per yard, and that the grantee hereof, within 10 days after written notice from the City, shall pave said road between the rails and for two feet on each side thereof with asphaltic concrete not less than 6" in thickness and the same in repair flush with the street, and shall, of its own expense, make the roadbed conform at all times to the grade of said street, as now or hereafter established, and all repairs and grades to be made under the instruction and to the satisfaction of the City of Torrance; in case the said grantee fails to comply with the instructions given for said repairs or change of grade within ten days after service of notice thereof, the City of Torrance may enter upon the road of said grantee and do the work and keep an itemized account of the cost thereof, which said grantee, by acceptance of this franchise, agrees to pay immediately on the presentation to said grantee of said account.

Provided, further, that the construction, maintenance, and operation of said track, including the placing of all poles and wires for electric operation, shall be subject to such reasonable ordinances of the City now in force or which may hereafter be enacted.

Provided further that said grantee or assigns shall construct all necessary flumes and culverts for the free passage of water under the tracks of said railway where and whenever necessary, and that all curves, turnouts, and switches shall be constructed under plans and specifications approved by the City Engineer, or by the City Council of said City; and it is understood that said grantee or assigns shall have the right to excavate and remove portions of the street necessary to properly construct and maintain said road and to erect needful appurtenances to properly equip and run the same.

It is further understood that the City, in making the grant of this franchise, expressly reserves the right to pave, macadamize, remove or sewer any of said streets, or lay gas and water or other pipes therein, such work to be done so as to injure said road as little as possible.

SECTION III. The above rights and privileges are granted upon the express conditions that work upon said track shall be begun within four months of the taking effect of this ordinance, and continue diligently thereafter and shall be completed within twelve months thereafter.

SECTION IV. The grant of this franchise is effective only upon the further condition that the grantee, within five days after said franchise is awarded to it, file with the said City Council a bond running to said City in the penal sum of One Thousand Dollars with at least two good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by said City Council, conditioned that said grantee shall well and truly observe, fulfill and perform each and every term and condition of said franchise, and that in case of any breach of condition of said bond the whole amount of the penal sum therein named shall be taken and

deemed to be liquidated damages, and shall be recoverable from the principal and sureties upon said bond.

SECTION V. That said grantee, its successors or assigns, are hereby required to file a written acceptance of the terms and conditions thereof with the Clerk of said City within thirty days after the passage of this ordinance.

SECTION VI. Said City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance, and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper published in the City of Torrance, and thereupon and thereafter it shall take effect and be in force.
