Valley Lecture To Be Held Here On October 16

Necessity for a set foreign policy backed by an enlightened and united people, is a firm conclusion reached by Lorita Baker Valley, popular reviewer of world affairs and current books, as the result of her trip to Europe this summer.

"Such a foreign policy, adhered to, will keep us from drifting into another war," declared Mrs. Valley. "The people must be aroused and familiar with problems of international import."

In addition to discussion of these problems, Mrs. Valley in her initial lecture at Torrance Woman's club, on Wednesday, Oct. 16, will review "Big Ben," a London play dealing satirically with Britain's governmental situations and "State of the Union" doing somewhat the same for the U.S.A.
