KETTLER TRACT WINS FHA APPROVAL; CONSTRUCTION WILL START ON 201 HOMES

proximity of oil wells to the area.

When this tract and that of Johnson was frowned upon, local civic leaders at once undertook a program to overcome the objections of the FHA. The City Council, Chamber of Commerce, Lions club and other organizations adopted resolutions which were transmitted directly to President Truman, Senators Downey and Knowland, Rep. Cecil B. King and others asking that early approval be given Torrance tracts by the FHA due to the critical housing condition in this industrial city.

Wilson W. Wyatt, chief federal expeditor and other agencies responded at once to the resolutions, and this week a letter from Keith Linden, secretary to Representative King was received enclosing a letter from Raymond M. Foley, commissioner of the Federal Housing Administration which said that "submissions from Torrance will have our prompt consideration." Foley said that only one application for approval has been received and that it had been okayed. It is assumed that this is the Kettler tract. Some seven other applications are pending, it was said by Blaine Walker, executive secretary of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, to whom the letter was addressed by Linden.

Local interests saw a break in the bottleneck which has held Torrance home-building back, in the action accorded by the FHA to Kettler, and with water and sewer development projects proceeding, it is predicted that hundreds of new homes may be completed in Torrance this year.

Leather-Lungers Respond To Call By Tartar Coach

Answering Coach Pete Zamperini's first call for cross-country men, a small but potent array of Tartar leather-lungers turned out last Monday to start the initial running season.

With a few monogram-bearers returning, Mentor Zamperini should have some fine material to work with. It looks as if Bill Spangler, last year's spark-plug, will receive considerable opposition from Oscar Escobedo. Escobedo was unable to compete last season, but showed plenty of ability in his tenth grade year.
