

Presbyterians Gather To Push Drive For Fund

At least 3,000 Presbyterians are expected from all over Southern California to attend a great mass meeting tonight in the Immanuel Presbyterian Church in Los Angeles. The meeting is being held for the purpose of raising one million dollars, a part of a nation-wide \$27,000,000 Restoration Fund for the rebuilding of churches in foreign lands and bringing physical and spiritual aid to the people there.

Frank M. Totton, vice-president of the Chase National Bank, will fly from New York to be the principal speaker at the meeting. Totton, who is a member of the boards of some 20 philanthropic agencies, serves as national chairman of the Laymen's Committee of the Restoration Fund. Former governor of the state of Oregon, the Hon. Charles A. Sprague, will also be on hand as a speaker. Sprague is chairman of the Restoration Fund for the western states.

Other speakers will be Dr. Louis H. Evans, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Hollywood, and Dr. Edward L. R. Elson, former chaplain with armed forces in Germany who is now western regional director of the Restoration Fund. Elson will speak at a banquet for pastors and lay workers of the Presbytery to be held in the dining hall of the Immanuel Presbyterian Church immediately preceding the mass meeting at 8:00 o'clock.

Dr. Adele Eiler Maternal, Child Hygiene Director

Appointment of Dr. Adele R. Eiler as acting director of the bureau of maternal and child hygiene of the Los Angeles county health department was announced last week by Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, county health officer.

The appointment follows the retirement Oct. 1 of Dr. Anna E. Rude, director of this bureau for the past seventeen years, with Doctor Eiler serving as her assistant for a part of this time.

The new bureau director is a University of Indiana graduate and interned in the San Francisco Children's hospital. She was also the first obstetrical resident at the Los Angeles County general hospital. Doctor Eiler has been a clinician in the bureau of maternal and child hygiene of the County health department since 1923, and has conducted prenatal clinics and child hygiene conferences in many county health districts including Torrance.

She and her husband, Dr. John O. Eiler, and their two children reside at 1171 Park avenue, Bellflower.

New Catholic School Proposed For Gardena

Rev. A. C. Murray, pastor of St. Anthony's Catholic Church, Gardena, has announced that the parish was successful in acquiring sufficient property on which to construct its proposed \$200,000 Catholic high school.

The property is located across the street from the present church and school buildings. It extends from 163rd st. through to 161st and from Borendo to New Hampshire aves, covering four acres, excepting for three lots on 163rd st. Purchase price was \$23,000.

Tentative plans call for the construction of one main building, devoted to classrooms and laboratories, a gymnasium and a social hall. The remainder of the grounds will be used for playground and athletic fields for both the high school and the grades. The landscaping of all unused grounds will complete the campus.

Father Murray stated that he expected an initial enrollment of at least 300 students from Gardena and surrounding cities and territories. The faculty will be composed of both the Sister and lay instructors.

Church Census To Be Conducted Next Sunday

Next Sunday will be Church Census Day in Torrance, Los Angeles and other cities. During a house-to-house canvass, by 20,000 religious workers, householders will be asked to tell whether they belong to any church.

Dr. M. Owen Kellison, chairman of the Evangelism Department of the Los Angeles Church Federation, heads the religious census movement. Members of 300 Southern California churches will participate in taking the census during the afternoon. The Rev. John E. Orr, of Community Presbyterian Church, Lomita, is local chairman.

The purpose of the census, which is the largest of its kind ever undertaken in this country, is to lay the ground work for evangelistic services. No one will be asked to join a church, but merely to state affiliation if any.
