**Timbermen Vote Rules This Week**  
 Forest practice rules, designed by representatives of the lumber industry to include fire protection and logging practices and provisions for restocking forest land, will be submitted for vote this week to all timber and timberland owners of California, reports P. H. McCannles, forest manager for the State Division of Forestry and spokesman for the Forest Practice Committees appointed last year by Governor Earl Warren. Under provisions of the Forest Practice Act, passed by the 1945 Legislature, the rules must have, by written ballot, the approval of two-thirds of the timber land owners and the State Board of Forestry before becoming law-binding in the harvesting of timber on private forest lands of California. McCannles indicated that ballots are in the mail and will reach all registered timber owners by Oct. 15.

**Mineral Oil Use By Restaurants Brings Warning**  
 Following the discovery that several food establishments in the county have been serving salad dressing made from mineral oil, contrary to the pure food laws of California, further investigations are being made along this line, Jonathan R. Kirkpatrick, chief of the food and drug inspection for the Los Angeles county health department, warned. During the fat and oil shortage some concerns have used mineral oil for cooking oil as well as salad dressing, Kirkpatrick said. In 1943 the California legislature outlawed the use of this oil in food, the food being considered adulterated if mineral oil has been added to it. According to health officials, vitamin A or the carotene in green and yellow vegetables and fruits may be absorbed by the mineral oil and eliminated unused. This may also prove to be true of other essential food factors, especially vitamin D, calcium and phosphorus. "While there is a place for mineral oil in medicine," the chief pointed out, "it should only be taken with specified recommendation of a physician."

**Contact Vets' Agency On Death, Government Asks**  
 In accordance with recent instructions issued by Colonel Thomas J. Cross, acting deputy administrator of the Veterans' Administration, San Francisco, it is the intention of the Veterans' Administration to bring its service closer to the veterans and their dependents. Veterans of all wars are entitled to this service. Says Colonel Cross, "It is the policy of the Veterans' Administration to have Contact Personnel furnish all possible assistance to the next of kin upon the demise of veterans." It is further recommended that liaison be established with all Coroners and Undertakers so that Contact Offices and Veterans' Service Centers will be promptly advised of the death of veterans. Colonel Cross further stated, "As important as assisting the survivors with the rights and benefits to which they are entitled by law, are the responsibilities that rest with the Veterans' Administration with respect to the unwritten entitlements. These unwritten entitlements," says the Colonel, "involve the establishment of a personal relationship during the initial contact with the family of a deceased veteran in order that no required assistance will be overlooked."

**CHECK ON HEATERS URGED TO PREVENT MONOXIDE FUMES**  
 With the advent of cooler weather, Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, Los Angeles county health officer, cautioned householders against the use of defective heating equipment which might cause carbon monoxide poisoning. Attention is particularly called to the importance of adequate ventilation these mornings when gas ovens are lighted to take the chill off the kitchen. All heating equipment should be checked before being put back into winter service, for if the flame is not properly adjusted the unburned gas creates carbon monoxide. As this unburned gas has no odor and cannot be detected, carbon monoxide poisoning can creep over occupants of a closed room without being detected, Dr. Gilbert warned.

**Spring Vacation Season For Golden State Sponsored by All-Year Club**  
 Getting the jump on Florida vacation during peak season of the All-Year club today announced that henceforth Southern California will offer spring as a new vacation season. "This completes the Southland's 'family' of four seasons, stretching completely around the year. For years, the area's community travel advertising has offered winter and summer. Fall, always an 'off-season' with a dip in business, was advertised this year for the first time. Addition of spring, also an 'off-season' dip in business, was announced by Don Thomas, managing director, at directors' meeting of the All-Year club, community travel promotion organization, at the Los Angeles Biltmore hotel. Willard Keith, president, presided. Thomas said the move will gain the Southland a smooth, stable, year-round flow of tourist money in future years. "Southern California," he explained, "now becomes the envy of America's resort areas. Florida is now boosting summer as well as winter. New England advertises fall as well as summer. But none can match our four good seasons. This gives the Southland a tremendous economic advantage. With good seasons in spring and fall, we are shunting vacation travel into these 'off-seasons' and thus relieving congested summer and winter. "For the years ahead, we are building a steady, smooth, year-around flow of travel income with less dips in 'off-seasons.' "This stabilizes business. It enables the community's economic machinery to operate more efficiently. It steadies employment, reducing the seasonal variations." Thomas said fall was successfully introduced "for what we know it to be—a delightful 'second summer,' lasting Sept. 1 to Dec. 1. Spring is being presented as a fresh green season of wildflowers, flowering orchards and trout fishing, lasting from March 1 to May 1." A quarter century of campaigning is climaxed by this rilling out of the "family" of seasons. The All-Year club was formed in 1921 to give the Southland an "all-year-around" vacation travel business.
