George Winters Acquitted By Jury Of Battery

A Torrance jury yesterday acquitted George Winters of a battery charge brought by Lester Holzclaw. Holzclaw told the jury that Winters, a resident of the Murray hotel, pulled him out of a fight in which he apparently had the upperhand, then struck him (Holzclaw) with his fist, knocking him to the ground.

Winters countered to the jury that when he saw a man down and being kicked by the complainant, he stepped in to avoid further mistreatment of the man downed. He declared that Holzclaw took offense to his actions and started to swing on him. Winters indicated that in defending himself it was necessary to offend Holzclaw with a punch on the jaw.

City Prosecutor Otto B. Willett told the jury that a man of Winters' size could have avoided further conflict by walking away and since he had stopped the first fight and done his duty as a citizen, Winters should have withdrawn from further conflict.

The jury evidently agreed that the best defense is a good offense.
