## INDIGENTS ABLE TO WORK MUST EARN AID FROM COUNTY

A statement of policy whereby employables who become destitute and are forced to seek county relief will be put to work as laborers on county government projects to earn the aid given them, was made here this week by County Manager Wayne R. Allen.

According to county officials men out on a strike will be eligible for county relief projects, but they will have to prove they are destitute. They, like other employables, after proving they are destitute, will be given three days to find employment in private industry. If at the end of that time they have not obtained a job the county will offer them work on relief projects which will be wholly of a labor nature, Allen said.
