

Local Church Youth Leaders Get Group Bid

All persons in this community who are leaders of church youth groups are invited to join the Leaders Association, a newly formed organization open to all volunteer workers in youth groups in all Los Angeles churches. It was announced this week by the group work division of the Church Federation Welfare Bureau.

Robert Giles, Association chairman and a member of the adult division of the county probation department, states that the purpose of the Association is to exchange program ideas and discuss mutual problems.

At present, Association membership consists of leaders of more than 65 church sponsored youth projects which were organized with the Church Welfare Bureau's assistance in the most underprivileged areas of the city where youth opportunities are limited. More leaders from churches are needed, Giles stated, to work with other clubs which are now in process of formation.

"The importance of youth guidance projects in the training of boys and girls for Christian citizenship cannot be over-emphasized," asserted Giles. "Such projects meet the interest of all adults who are concerned in building a better world."

The Church Welfare Bureau, a Community Chest agency, will be among the 152 health and welfare agencies to share in the \$6,495,200 goal now being sought by the Chest.

The Golden Text of the Sunday Lesson—Sermon on "Everlasting Punishment" in all branches of the Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, is from the Psalms and reads: "The Lord is known by the judgment which he executeth; the wicked is snared in the work of his own hands."

Victimizing Of Vets On Home Deals Revealed

A rapidly-spreading racket to victimize Southland veteran home-seekers by deliberately misinforming them as to their rights under the Veterans' Emergency Housing Act in attempts to obtain above-ceiling prices, has been disclosed.

Ernest Adams, Southern California district OPA veterans adviser, declared that numerous veterans have been told that once they buy a new VEHF home at more than the lawful figure, they are in violation along with the seller and therefore cannot recover overcharges.

"This," Adams said, "is absolutely untrue. A veteran who pays more than the ceiling price established by FHA is NOT a violator. He is in injured party and under the law is entitled to restitution. The OPA, now charged with enforcement of the VEHF program, is authorized to obtain such restitution, either by voluntary compliance or by court action."






