Veterans would save thousands of dollars each month in transportation costs, telephone calls and postage if they would learn the location of their nearest VA contact office and use it.

When General Omar N. Bradley became Administrator of Veterans Affairs he asked the VA to take its services to the veterans. Considerable progress in this decentralization program has been made in all VA departments.

Contact stations have been established wherever veteran population warrants and personnel and equipment permit. There are 24 such stations in the area covered by the Los Angeles VA regional office. Money, time, and trouble would be saved if veterans would avail themselves of this decentralized service.

At least 20,000 of the 60,000 former servicemen who call at metropolitan offices monthly could secure the same service much nearer their own homes. A total of 60,406 telephone calls were received by the regional office during October and a high percentage of these calls came long distance from communities with easily accessible VA offices.

Veterans write an average of 18,000 letters monthly to regional contact headquarters from areas equipped to handle the problems these letters explain.

Handling Of Price Control Matters Explained By Retiring L.B. Leader

The Price Control Board at Long Beach, serving the county of Los Angeles, closed on November 4, E. T. Martin, chairman of the local board announced today.

This step marks the conclusion of almost five years of unprecedented patriotic service by the citizens of this county who, through their thousands of hours of volunteer work have prevented inflationary dangers from taking effect and saw that their neighbors had an equal right to their fair share of scarce commodities during the days of rationing," Mr. Martin said.

Members of Long Beach's price control board stayed on the job for more than a year after the end of the war. Production has had a chance to catch up with demand. Now that President Truman has announced the program for accelerating the remaining wartime controls, Price Administrator Paul A. Porter has determined that the remaining functions of local boards can be continued by the District OPA

office at 1206 Santee st., Los Angeles 15, California." Martin gave the following information as to the conducting of OPA business in the future:

1. Trade and consumer inquiries about price control formerly handled by price control boards should be addressed to the OPA District office in Los Angeles.

2. Certificates of transfer covering sales of used passenger automobiles may be obtained from principal auto dealers. Dealers should request additional supplies from the OPA Regional Mail center at 1267 Mission st., San Francisco, Calif.
