I was horribly shocked today to notice the total lack of respect for our fallen comrades in the City of Torrance. I have been a member in good standing of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars for over 27 years, served my country in two wars and have always tried to be a good citizen, but what I witnessed in Torrance today makes me ashamed to admit I live here or have endeavored to uphold the ideals of true Americanism all my life.

Not one sign did I observe today on the streets, in the churches or in public spirit to lead me to believe that anybody had remembered it was Armistice Day—the one day each year that we pay homage to those brave lads who gave their lives to make this a better country to live in and one on which we keep our solemn pledges to honor such dead. When God some day brings those guilty souls face-to-face with their fallen comrades how do you suppose they will be able to justify such disrespect and "broken pledges"?

The public-at-large are to be condemned for their selfishness and un-American attitude, but that is not enough. The commanders of each of the Torrance-posts of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars should not be blamed, for it appears on the surface that the blame falls on certain elements within each organization wherein they foster such a rivalry.

It is a pity that the rivalry that exists between both units, therefore, if the members persist upon failing their leaders, the charters of each organization should be scrapped as a piece of worthless paper for planning respectful demonstrations for our fallen heroes. If I was in my cold grave I would pray to God for the chance to turn over and point the finger of scorn at those guilty of today's unexcusable dishonor.

The streamlined course requires three weeks time to complete with classes meeting twice a week to fulfill the 12 hours required to gain the Red Cross certificate and pin.

"Care for the Sick at Home" is the overall theme of Red Cross' home nursing classes, with special emphasis on recognition of symptoms of serious diseases. Registered nurses, well versed in home nursing procedure and techniques, serve as instructors for all Red Cross classes.
