### Torrance Left Out Of Picture As Township Division Is Contemplated

Just where Torrance figures in the picture in a proposed Inglewood Bar Association split up of the Inglewood Judicial township into three townships, with three courts, remained a mystery this week that even City Attorney John McCall, a member of the committee named to study the problem of crowded conditions in the Justice courts could not solve.

The city attorney told the Torrance Herald that the committee report announced last week by D. Clifford Biggins, Manhattan Beach, president of the Inglewood Bar Association, was not to have been made, but that it should have been considered first with a sugges-

tion of Justice of the Peace Frank Carrell, Gardena Justice court, and McCall for splitting the township at a fixed line, possibly Redondo Beach boulevard and an extension of its diagonal course. That would place Torrance, Gardena, Hermosa Beach, Redondo Beach,

Lomita and Palos Verdes in one township, Manhattan Beach, Lawndale, Hawthorne, Inglewood and El Segundo would be in the other township. Declaring that "Inglewood township of Los Angeles County is too big for judicial purposes," and that it should be broken up into three townships, the committee will submit its report to the Bar Association by Nov. 30 after which it is expected that a petition will be filed with the County Board of Supervisors asking a redistricting of the entire township.

There are now two justices of the peace in the Township, one at Inglewood and one at Gardena. It is proposed by those behind the measure that one township be created with Gardena as its center; one with Inglewood as its center and the third to include the beach communities of Palos Verdes, Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, Manhattan Beach and El Segundo, with possibly Hermosa Beach as the site of the Justice court.

Inglewood township then would have an approximate pop-

ulation of 110,000, Gardena 75,000 and the new township 75,000.

The committee apparently has left Torrance out of consideration of the problem, it is said locally.

Many suggestions have been made that Torrance and Lomita be placed in a judicial township of its own.

Under the present arrangement all cases ranking above those of a police court must be taken either to Inglewood or Gardena. The beach cities feel there would be a saving in time and effort if they had their own justice of the peace.
