STATE PARKS GET ALL-TIME RECORD IN ATTENDANCE

An all-time record for attendance at the more than 80 parks, beaches and historical monuments of the State Park System during the 1946 season will bring total attendance for the year to an estimated 22,000,000 persons.

This estimate, announced today by A. E. Henning, Chief of the State Division of Beaches & Parks, Department of Natural Resources, is based upon an attendance report of 20,092,287 up to September 30.

Previous record attendance was in 1941 when approximately 13,000,000 visitors were recorded.
