Legion Auxiliary Reports Progress Of Current Member Drive

One million women will be members of the American Legion Auxiliary in 1947, Mrs. Mable Williams, membership captain of Bert S. Crossland unit predicted, as the organization continued enrollment of members for the year ahead.

The prediction was based on the Auxiliary's rapid growth during the past year and the greatly increased number of women now eligible to membership. In 1946 the Auxiliary reached a national enrollment of 800,000, a gain of approximately 168,000 over the previous year.

"Already the largest organization of its kind by far, the American Legion Auxiliary is now in a period of great expansion," said Mrs. Williams. "We expect the enrollment of one million women for 1947, and we will have need for every one of them to carry out the Auxiliary's part of the Legion's activities for the veterans and the nation."

"The record growth of the Auxiliary in the past year has made it into a two-war organization. A majority of the members are women of World War II families, the wives, mothers, sisters and daughters of the young veterans, as well as women who themselves were in the armed forces during the recent war. They are bringing the vigor and vision of youth into our organization."

"Like the national organization, our local unit has made great strides in the past year. We have grown from 77 members to an enrollment of 103, and we expect even greater growth during 1947. We have an active year ahead, full of interesting and important work which we are inviting all eligible women in the city to share with us."


