an election to decide which high school district, Redondo Union or Los Angeles, Torrance shall belong in the first year of operation by Torrance Board of Education of the local schools. If Torrance votes to join Redondo, the entire city automatically becomes a part of the El Camino Junior college district.

Otherwise, Torrance must remain in Los Angeles high school district for another year, with membership in the Los Angeles Junior college district and no local facilities available for classes.

Many Torrance college people are attending the El Camino college classes being held at Redondo Union high school.

El Camino Junior college district was formed last summer by a vote of more than 20 to one.

C.A.P. Command Changes, Lease Of Field Claimed

by Captain Perkins in talks with city officials. The fact that the U.S. Engineers and the Public Roads Administration have considered the whole future of the airport to be subject to the will of the City of Torrance to occupy and operate also is testified to in compliance agencies.

While the group headed by Captain Perkins claims access to the tiedown rights of some 85 airplanes now stationed at the Army-developed airport in addition to revenues from the sale of gasoline, oil and maintenance service, it is understood in official circles that the government is moving toward occupancy by the City of Torrance of all the area in the vast 480-acre airfield on an ownership or satisfactory lease basis in the near future.

On the other hand, Captain Perkins' group was reported to be faced with the necessity of raising sufficient funds to execute the lease and carry out its provisions in the terms of commercial operation.

While the question of jurisdiction of the whole airport was a state of uncertainty, operations were being carried on during the past week, it is said, without adequate central regulation and authority. This, it is reported by experienced airport operators, should be exercised by the City of Torrance since the city has accepted jurisdiction to the landing strip of the airport—this strip holding the key to operations of the entire field.
