Food Poisoning Warning Given
By Dr. Gilbert

With 1946 food poisoning cases reported 2 1/2 times more than those of 1945, Dr. Roy O. Gilbert, Los Angeles county health officer, has issued a warning to housewives and restaurant owners regarding the storage of food.

Various causes have contributed to the increase in food poisoning but health officials believe the rapid turnover of restaurant personnel who are not properly trained in their respective jobs is one of the factors.

Another reason may be the lack of proper refrigeration. With meat more plentiful, sanitarians find that many cooks are overbuying without regard for proper storage of left-overs. They are cautioned not to leave food unrefrigerated in summer, but it is claimed that food is inadequately stored in a warm kitchen in wintertime is just as hazardous to health.

"Keep it hot or keep it cold" is the year-round advice for storing perishable food according to Dr. Gilbert.
