Red Cross Winds Up Record-Setting Year Of Activities

Concluding a record-setting peacetime year of activity, Los Angeles Red Cross chapter today looked forward to continuance of its varied services—to hospitalized veterans, to veterans, discharged, servicemen and their families, and to the community through its educational training courses.

The year 1946 saw an expanding increase in services requested by Veterans Administration hospitals in this locale and a boost in the number of veterans' cases handled by the Home Service department.

Los Angeles chapter also ranked near the top of the major chapters of the nation in the issuance of certificates in home nursing, first aid, water safety and accident prevention.

One of the outstanding contributions made by Red Cross to the community this past year was the operation of the Blood Donor center in downtown Los Angeles, through which whole blood is supplied to veteran and civilian hospitals for transfusion use. The center is seeking to fulfill the minimum request of 500 pints per week to fill quotas set by hospitals in and about Los Angeles.

At the present time Red Cross is engaged in recruitment and training of additional volunteers needed to carry out assignments requested by Veterans Administration hospital officials here in Southern California, as well as to supply corps workers in wards of some civilian installations.

The initial key project facing Los Angeles Red Cross in 1947 is the staging of the annual drive for funds, which gets under way here March 1.






