

Election Marks Annual Meeting Of St. Andrew's

The Vestry meeting in its first session re-elected Rice as parish treasurer, Eade as clerk and elected as junior warden A. C. Turner. Walter Post continues to serve as senior warden. The rector's report included the vital statistics of the parish.

Full time services of the Family Service Association became a reality recently, with the appointment of Mrs. Junè Daniel as local representative. Mrs. Daniel is now at the Welfare Center five days a week from 9:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m., for counseling to families and individuals.

Mrs. Daniel comes to Torrance from San Diego, where she was employed by the Travelers' Aid Society. She is a graduate of the USC School for Social work, and is a native Californian.

Families having marital difficulties, child behavior problems, physical disabilities and mental upsets are invited to use the counseling services. Financial assistance is given if necessary in working out a problem. Family Service Association is a non-sectarian agency, which has branches in all parts of the Community Chest territory. Mrs. Daniel acts as representative for Torrance, Lomita and Gardena.

Child Hygiene Conferences To Be Mondays

Child hygiene conferences which have been held in the Torrance health center on Friday afternoon from 12:45 to 3 o'clock, Dr. Vera Wayman, pediatrician in charge has announced. Mothers with children under two years of age are invited to bring them to the conferences for immunizations against small pox, diphtheria and whooping cough. The service also includes dietary advice, search for physical defects and arrangements for remedial care. Health habits and child management will also be discussed by Dr. Wayman with the individual mothers.

Parents are requested not to bring sick children to these conferences as it is an educational service of the Los Angeles county health department for well babies only.

Miss Anita Terrell and Mrs. Amelle Jones are the public health nurses who assist the pediatrician. Appointments should be made by telephone prior to attendance in order that there may not be a long, tiresome wait with the children.

Paul M. Watson was named by the City Council to fill the vacancy on the Torrance Civil Service Board created by the resignation of H. P. Raymond Tuesday night.


Raymond was chairman of the board and resigned as of Dec. 18, although his letter did not reach the council until the meeting of Jan. 7.
