Thomas and Anderson Backing More State Aid For Child Care Centers

Assemblymen Vincent Thomas and Glenn M. Anderson are spearheading the move to keep child care centers in harbor district and bay cities area open with state funds, it has been revealed this week.

Anderson reported on one center in this area declaring that his investigation had proved the centers still are badly needed. "In two centers I have found that the percentage where mothers are the sole support of children is very high," Anderson said, "and it is my opinion that the centers should stay open."

Assemblyman Thomas has expressed similar views. Anderson, who represents the South Bay cities, Inglewood and Hawthorne, in the 46th Assembly district, continued:

"There seems to be some misconception on the part of a few of our people concerning the need of child care centers, and also as to whether these centers actually provide a service for the community.

"A communication that I received from the Child Care center in Hawthorne I believe exemplifies the condition that exists throughout the state in regard to the need of these centers.

"In the Hawthorne Center there are one hundred and eleven children enrolled. The following is a breakdown of the status of the parents of these children:

"In 22 cases the mother is the sole support of the child. "In 19 of the cases the father is a G.I. making use of the educational provisions of the GI Bill. It is obvious that a family cannot live on the \$90 a month provided by the Federal government under this act, and if the father is to continue his education the mother must work. "In 4% of the cases, the father's income is extremely low, and the mother is working to maintain a minimum standard of living. With the increasing costs that are confronting these people with a low income, it becomes difficult to maintain the standard of living that this nation desires, even when both husband and wife work.

"In 18 of these cases, the combined income of both parents is over \$200 a month, but the number of dependents, or family circumstances, necessitate the mother working.

"Five of the mothers had returned to teaching due to the crucial teacher shortage. Two mothers had returned to nursing because of the present nurse shortage. In these last two groups, it is not the parent who necessarily benefits by the use of the centers as much as it is of benefit to the community.

"I have visited child care centers in Inglewood, Westchester, Manhattan Beach and several others, and in every instance I find the economic condition of the parent or parents to be very similar to these cases from Hawthorne."

FIRE EQUIPMENT USE BILL WINS SUPERVISORS' OKAY

County supervisors last week went on record in favor of state legislation which would permit fire engines in 29 county fire protective districts of Los Angeles County, to be used irrespective of district county lines in case of emergency period.

According to Supervisor John Anson Ford, such a measure would also permit the sending of inhalator equipment beyond district boundaries.

STORM

Old Man Weather can be mighty tough on telephone lines, especially in the High Sierras and Cascades where snow often piles high enough to cover poles completely and ice builds up several inches thick on wires. But when a major break occurs, crews of telephone workers swing into action fast... and with some rather ingenious equipment.

A biplane like this one, powered by an airplane motor and propeller, can carry two men and considerable material on trails which would be impossible for trucks. Other expert mountaineer workmen speed to the break on snowshoes and skis. As a special safeguard against sudden storms, well-equipped shelter huts have been built along mountain lines.

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
