**Mobile X-Ray Unit Sets Record On Torrance Visit**

Announcement was made today by Dr. Don Moshos, chairman of the Torrance Health Committee, that more than 2,000 persons were X-rayed in the mobile X-ray unit of the Los Angeles County Tuberculosis and Health Association, during its visit in Torrance, the week of Jan. 13.

The Association reported that this is the largest number of persons X-rayed in a community program in the county.

Reports on the results of the X-rays will be mailed within approximately six weeks, Dr. Moshos stated.

**Filing Of U.S. Forms 1096, 1099 Due Saturday**

Warning was issued today by Collector of Internal Revenue Harry C. Westover that Federal information returns on Forms 1096 and 1099 must be filed on or before next Saturday, Feb. 15.

"Employers who during 1946 paid any individual \$500 or more in wages from which no income tax was withheld must report such wages on these information forms. Agricultural and domestic salaries are exempt from withholding tax and must be accounted for on these returns.

Rentals in excess of \$500 paid to individuals other than agents must also be reported; as must premiums, annuities, royalties, and interest payments. These forms should be sent to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Processing Division, 260 E. 161 st., New York. They are not to be filed with the local revenue office," Westover said.

**VET HOUSING**

The Torrance Area Veterans Service center has not relaxed in its efforts to secure housing for the members of the armed services who had active service between Oct. 8, 1940 and Sept. 2, 1946, both dates inclusive, are eligible to apply for NSLI. General Omar N. Bradley has announced a three-month campaign, Feb. 3 to May 3, to give veterans the facts about their insurance. It is an information program and not an intensified selling drive. The general stated that thousands of veterans had dropped their wartime protection because they had insufficient knowledge about its peace-time value.

Here are some of the important facts about NSLI each veteran should know: Every dollar of premiums collected is held in trust and invested at interest for eventual return as benefits to policyholders or their beneficiaries.

**Remains Of War Dead To Be Returned Here**

Tentative date for return of the first remains of America's World War II dead from temporary military cemeteries overseas is August, 1947, the War Department announced today.

Preliminary operational schedules prepared by the Office of the Quartermaster general contemplate that those who fell at Pearl Harbor and other armed forces personnel who now rest in seven cemeteries in Hawaii will reach the San Francisco port of embarkation about Aug. 18.

Those who are buried in the Henri Chapelle temporary cemetery in Belgium are scheduled to arrive at New York about Aug. 25.

Only the remains of those whose return is requested by next of kin will be brought back to the United States for final burial in either a private cemetery or a national cemetery.

Major General T. E. Larkin, the quartermaster general of the Army, said in announcing the tentative schedule. The schedule is based on the assumption that present casket manufacturing requirements will be met, that full-scale deliveries of caskets will begin in May, 1947, and that deliveries will continue without interruption until all orders have been filled. Current estimates are that 80 percent of recovered remains will be returned to the United States or the homeland of the deceased and that 20 percent will be interred permanently overseas.

Known, however, until all next of kin have responded to letters of inquiry which are to be mailed by the office of the quartermaster general.

Government pays expenses. All operating expenses and all excess costs resulting from death or total disability traceable to the extra hazards of the military or naval service are borne by the government and paid from separate appropriations.

No restrictions. There are no restrictions as to travel, residence, occupation, or military or naval service. The insured may live where he likes, go where he will and engage in any occupation no matter how hazardous without altering the terms of his contract or the amount of his premium.

Waiver of premiums. All policies provide for the waiver of payments during continuous total disability of the insured for six or more consecutive months commencing before his sixtieth birthday.

Taxations and other exemptions. The proceeds are exempt from all taxation (but such exemption does not extend to any property purchased with the proceeds). They are also exempt from claims of creditors of the insured or creditors of the beneficiaries and are not liable to attachment, levy or seizure.

**Funds Allocated For Construction Of Two Bridges**

Action of the Board of Supervisors today will make it possible the construction of two bridges over the Los Angeles river flood control channel in Long Beach.

Under a board order the county counsel was directed to prepare a resolution allocating \$50,000 to the City of Long Beach to assist in the construction of the Long Beach Blvd. and Willow st. bridges.

Supervisor Raymond V. Darby, chairman of the board, said the money would be provided out of the county's share of state funds set up in the Recovery plan construction and Employment Act of 1946.


