Speaking before an audience of 500 and reporting on her recent tour of European countries and on the recent world conference of Girl Scouting in Evion, France, Mrs. C. Vaughan Ferguson of New York City, national Girl Scout president, told of increased scouting activities there and the part Girl Scouts of the United States will have in raising half of a \$38,000 fund for world scouting.

Mrs. Ferguson is here to inspect the site of the national convention to be held Nov. 4-7 in Long Beach. She will continue her trip north along the Pacific coast, informing leaders of new procedures and business of the convention.

Seniors Will Attend
For the first time in scouting, seniors will attend a convention as voting delegates for their respective groups. Most important among convention business will be the problem of obtaining leaders. It was disclosed that 250,000 girls between the ages of 7 and 18 are in waiting lists of Girl Scout troops in the U. S. Leadership is the greatest need, according to Katie Lee Johnson of New York, member of the national staff and convention manager.

Standards for leadership are high, but not strict, and there should be more interested mothers, willing to assume responsibility, it was stated.

Membership Increase
Elsie Allan Thompson, executive director of the Los Angeles council, reported 140 percent increase in Girl Scout membership since 1941. Of the present total membership of 17,418 girls, there are 4,810 adult volunteers as group leaders. Even with this number, she said, less than 40 percent of the girls of the area are being reached by a girl agency.
