

Thomas Demands Accounting For Fish & Game Tax

Despite the objections of commission spokesmen in the assembly, Assemblyman Vincent Thomas of the local 68th district has obtained passage of a resolution requesting the fish and game commission to answer in detail several questions as to the disposition of the 50-cent-per-ton "privilege" tax levied against the fishing industry.

Thomas pointed out that this 50-cent contribution by the industry is supposed to go for research in commercial fishing "and to be spent in the district in which it is collected."

The legislator bluntly claimed the fish and game commission was not following the law in this matter and was appropriating the "privilege" tax funds for other fish and game activities not bearing benefit to the commercial fishermen.

He demanded that the commission account for its statement that from June 30, 1935, to June 30, 1946, the fish and game commission has built up a \$1,000,000 deficit in this fund, supposedly only spent as it is collected.

Assemblyman Thomas Erwin of Puente, chairman of the assembly fish and game committee, objected to the Thomas resolution on the grounds that it should be directed to the state division of natural resources, which Erwin contended is the accounting agent for the fish and game commission.

Assemblyman Lloyd Lowrey of Ramsey, during the heated debate on the measure, commented that "the bureaucracy of the fish and game commission is the worst in the entire state system."

Bishop Gooden Will Speak At St. Andrew's

The Rt. Rev. Robert B. Gooden, Suffragan Bishop of the Diocese of Los Angeles, will be at St. Andrew's on Palm Sunday, March 30. This will be Bishop Gooden's last official visit to St. Andrew's as he retires July 1 of this year.

Bishop Gooden will be the preacher at the 11 o'clock service. He will also confirm a class of adults and children.

This class is the third class within a year to be presented at St. Andrew's for confirmation. As a rule there is only one class a year. The growth of the parish and church school necessitated three classes.

The primary department will have the Bishop speak to them at 10:15 a.m., about the church's missionary work in the Philippine Islands, which is the subject of this year's children's study.

Following the service a reception will be held in the parish house for Bishop and Mrs. Gooden and the newly confirmed class. Members of the last confirmation class will be in charge of the reception.

Industry Shows Increase With New Factories

Twenty-one new factories and expansion of 30 existing plants, with investment of \$5,298,500, created 1,768 new industrial jobs in the metropolitan area last month.

Adding 525 new jobs, new factories cost \$1,028,000, while expansions, costing \$4,270,500, brought 1,243 additional openings.

In 97 new or expanded plants, \$11,861,500 have been invested so far this year, resulting in 4,543 new jobs. In 28 new factories, \$3,465,000 have been placed and 2,045 jobs created. Existing plant expansions numbering 59 have cost \$8,396,500 and added 2,488 new jobs.
